

## ANTRIM.

### REPORT upon the PROPOSED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY of the BOROUGH of ANTRIM.

THERE exists no certain information of the Boundaries of the Borough; it seems they lay within the Parish of Antrim, and were confined to the Townland of Antrim. ANCIENT LIMITS.

The Town of Antrim is situated on the North Bank of the Stream, called the "Six Mile River," about three quarters of a mile from its entrance into Lough Neagh. There are two paper mills and an extensive brewery in the Town, and the inhabitants are further employed in the manufacture of Linen. DESCRIPTION OF  
THE TOWN.

The Population in 1831 amounted to 2,655; some increase is said to have taken place since. Population.

The Church Rate for the Town for the year to end at Easter 1836, amounts to 17*l.* 10*s.* 5½*d.* Local Rate.

The proportion of the applotment of the County Cess for the Town of Antrim for the year ending at the Lent Assizes 1836 amounts to 180*l.* 15*s.* 5*d.* County Rates.

The following is a description of the proposed Boundary:—

From the Centre (1) of the Middle Pier of a Bridge which crosses Six Mile River, a little to the North-west of Antrim Castle, in a straight Line and North-easterly direction, to the Centre (2) of the Western Front of the Roman Catholic Chapel, North of the Town; thence in a straight Line, South-easterly, to (3) the North-east Pier of a Gate on the West Side of "Peddy's Lane," (otherwise called the Road to Kells) said Pier being distant about Two hundred and twenty-five Yards North-easterly from the Point where Peddy's Lane meets the main Street of the Town; thence to the North-east Angle of a Dwelling House, (4) built by Mr. M'Quillan, at the East Extremity of the Town, on the North of the New Belfast Turnpike Road, where it is joined by the Park Gate Road; thence, South-westerly, in a straight Line to the Point (5), where "Belmount Back Road" meets the old Belfast Road; thence, in a South-westerly direction, to the South-east Angle (6) of the very conspicuous Grain Store-house in Belmount Premises; thence in a straight Line, Westerly, to the South-east Angle (7) of Mill Row Paper Mill, belonging to Messrs. Fergusson & Co.; thence in a straight Line, North-westerly, to the Point (1) first described. PROPOSED

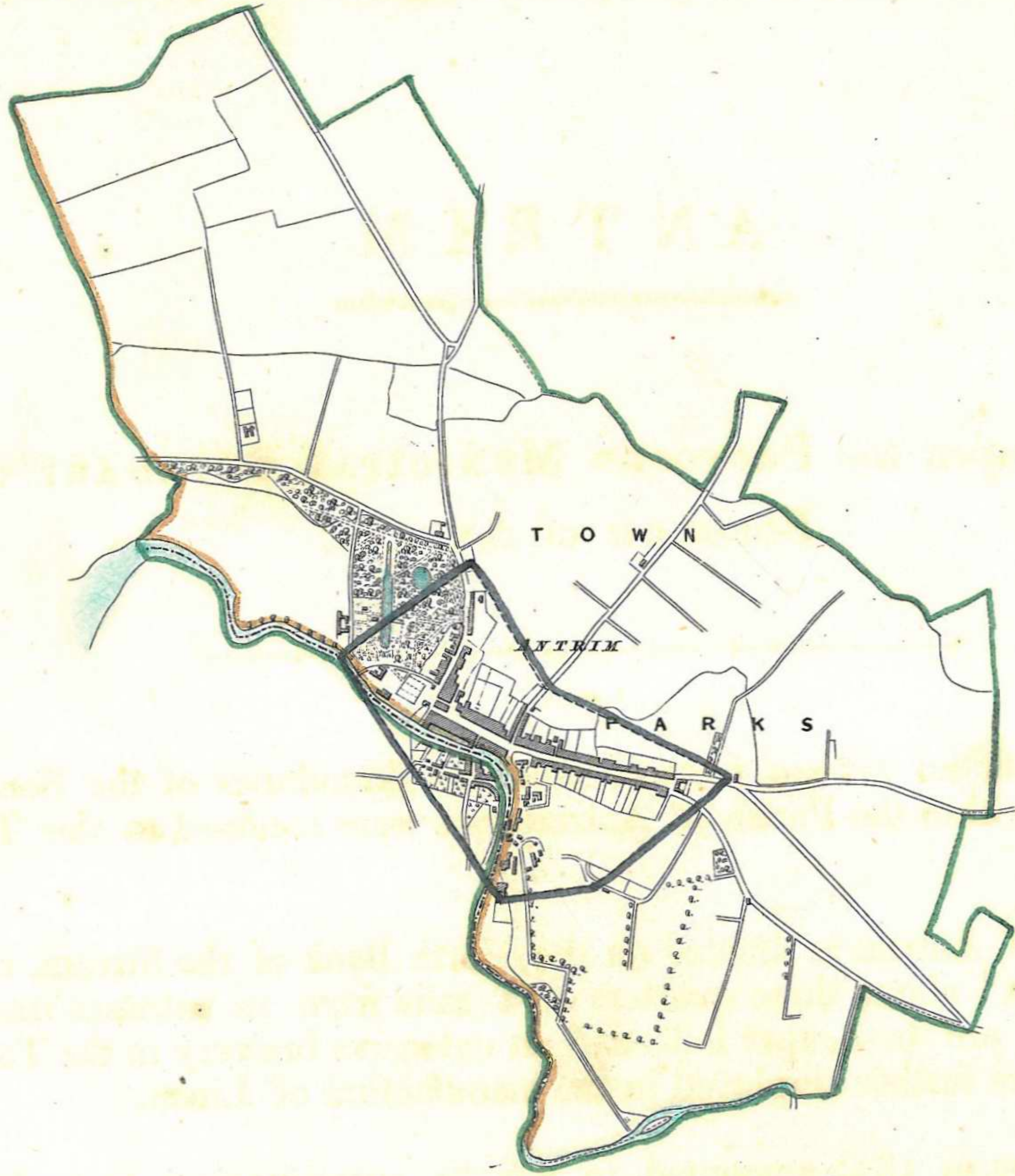

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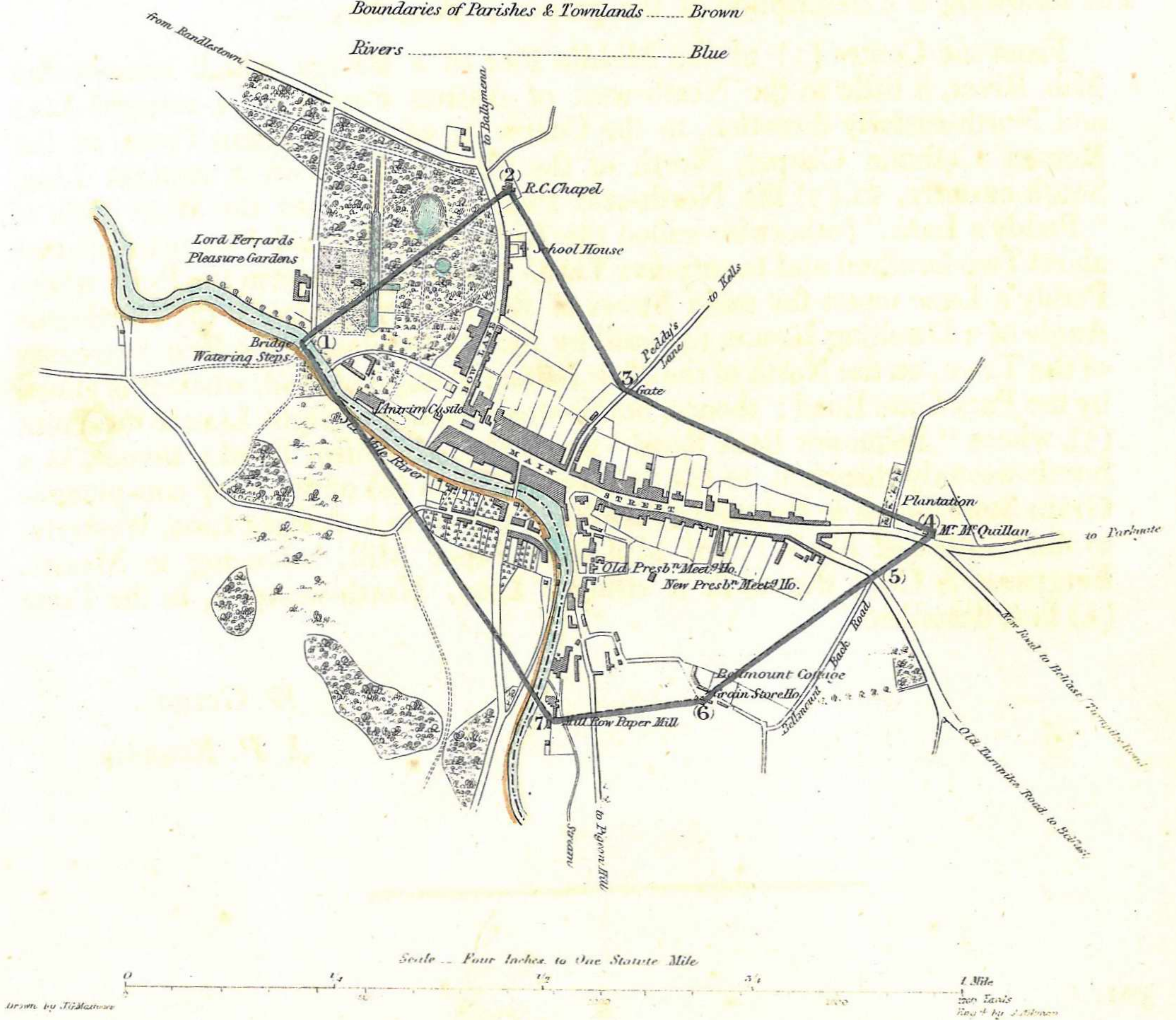
