ARMAGH.

REPORT upon the Proposed Municipal Boundary of the Borough of Armagh.

THE Limits of what is called the Corporation Land are well defined, (being the ANCIENT LIMITS. Callan River on the one side, and the Ballynahone River on the other) except in the part where the Boundary runs through the Primate's Demesne, and there all trace of it is lost. The extent of the Corporation Land is 1,147 statute acres, comprising the whole of the City as built upon.

The City of Armagh is the principal Town in the County of the same name, Description of and the Archiepiscopal See of the Primate of all Ireland. It lies in a central position in the extensive Parish of Armagh, in the Barony of Armagh, in the Province of Ulster; it is an improving Town, and of considerable business both in Grain and the Linen trade. A great improvement has taken place in Buildings within the last seven years.

The Population in 1831 amounted to 9,470; it has not varied much since that Population. period.

The Borough Cess is for the purpose of Paving, Lighting, Cleansing, and Local Rates. Watching the Town, and is levied under the provisions of 9 Geo. IV. c. 82. The amount of this Cess for the last three years has been 837 l. 6 s. 4 d. per annum.

The County Cess is levied for the purpose of keeping the Roads in repair, County Rate. supporting the Gaol, the Lunatic Asylum, paying the Constabulary, &c. It is assessed at the Spring and Summer Assizes by the Grand Jury, and fiated by the Judge. It is a variable Cess.


The following is a description of the proposed Boundary, being the same as that of the Parliamentary Borough.

From Mr. Kidd's Windmill (late Carroll's) (1), on the West of the City, PROPOSED in a straight Line in the direction of the Spire of Grange Church, to the BOUNDARY. Point at which such straight Line cuts the New Dungannon Road (2); thence in a straight Line in the direction of the Eastern Dome of the Observatory to the Point (3) at which such straight Line cuts the Boundary of the Grounds attached to the Observatory; thence, Eastward, along the Boundary of the Grounds of the Observatory to the Point (4) at which the same meets the Road to the Deanery; thence in a straight Line to the Magazine (5) near the Infantry Barracks; thence in a straight Line through a Point on the Rich Hill Road, which is distant Twenty-five Yards, (measured along the Rich Hill Road) to the East of the South-eastern Corner of the Infantry Barracks, to a Point (6) which is One hundred and thirty Yards beyond the said Point on the Rich Hill Road; thence in a straight Line in the direction of the South-eastern Angle of the Palace to the Point at which such straight Line cuts the Demesne Wall (7); thence, Northward, along the Demesne Wall to the Point at which the same leaves the Boundary of the Corporation Land (8); thence, Northward, along the Boundary of the Corporation Land to the Point at which the same meets the Monaghan Road (9); thence in a straight Line to the Point first described.


