The funeral of the lamented Col. Henry Anderson O'Donnell, C. B., took place on Thursday, at 12 o'clock, when the cavalcade moved from his house, George-street, towards Munchin's Church, in the following order:—Sixty of his tenantry in white scarfs and hat bands, twenty women in white cloaks, Archdeacon Maunsell and the Clergymen of the City, in their clerical gowns; the body of the deceased superbly cased in scarlet, and richly gilt, borne in a funeral car, drawn by six horses, in sable trappings; relatives and friends in mourning cloaks and weepers; Major-General Sir Wm. Macbean, K.C.B., Col. R. Mansel, K. H., and a large cortege of gentry on foot, medical gentlemen, &c. and upwards of fifty private carriages, preceded by the mourning coach of the gallant veteran. The cavalcade attracted the most respectful attention, as it passed through the streets. The burial service was read by Archdeacon Maunsell, and the Rev. Joseph Gabbett, after which the mortal remains of Col. O'Donnell were consigned to its kindred earth, amidst the regret of all present.

The Depot 7th Fusileers, under Major Sir W. Payne Gallwey, Bart. are quartered in the New Barracks, in this garrison. Sir William's father commanded this garrison in 1804, when he married Lady Harriett Quin, sister of the Earl of Dunraven.
