**AUCTION OF TIMBER.**

**TO THE CREDITORS**  
OF  
**MESSRS. STEVELLY AND SONS,**  
GENTLEMEN,

**H**AVING seen in the Correspondent of Monday, a Statement of the affairs of Messrs. STEVELLY and Co. said to be laid before you, by a person of the name of PENNOT, stating that two years since, they commenced Business with a capital of £30,000, and that they have since received £69,000 of the Public Money; and that in consequence of two Houses having contrived to get into their debt nearly £40,000, besides having a claim on the Estate of J. B. O'SULLIVAN for £8,000—and on that of Mr. MAZIERE for £1,400—their friends were of opinion, that they could not pay more than 12s. in the pound, with a contingent 1s. 4d. out of those debts, should they yield any thing, which he feared would not be the case: from this unusual mode of publishing names to the world, and being an interested party in this statement, I am induced to point out to you another statement which may be equally erroneous as that, but which I shall most readily submit to, when convinced to the contrary.

I shall merely state (that in consequence of a Commission of Bankruptcy, being now in prosecution against me, through Mr. STEVELLY, and other Bill Brokers in Dublin) that I am now ready to find security for any debt due of me to that Firm, to the extent of the proposition made by Mr. STEVELLY's friends for the payment of his debts, and that consequently his having many parties to look to for the £40,000, first alluded to, I shall draw a line on those Estates from what I have stated; and supposing the entire debt returned by them, amounting to £49,400, yield 12s. in the Pound, as I think they will—What would be the deficiency?—£19,760. Consequently, unless they show other losses, that would leave in their hands £10,240, of the capital of £30,000, stated that they had commenced with.

I have taken their statement according to their own return, and this may hereafter turn out to be erroneous as in the minor sum of eight thousand pounds, returned as due of me. I assert that I owe some thousands less than that returned—and for what purpose such an exaggerated sum was returned against me, I am unacquainted with, the Creditors probably may—as for myself, I have already been accustomed to be so represented by Mr. STEVELLY, and his party, that I am surprised at nothing that occurs through them—Mr. STEVELLY further forgot to state, that on this sum of eight thousand pounds, he had several other estates to look to besides mine, some of whom are equal to 20 shillings in the pound, and not failed as I know of. There may be some plea of excuse, for making this sum of eight thousand pounds appear against me, if I had with that Firm a running account, by which a mistake might arise, but that not being the case, but by Bills of Exchange, it is extraordinary how it should occur.

Should any circumstance take place to prevent my intention of attending at the meeting, appointed for the 3d of January, when I purpose to personally contradict that statement, in that case, may I request of you, to see the amount of those bills, and that all the names connected with them may appear, in order, that my debts should be fairly stated to the public. You will be further surprised to hear, that on some of those Bills, through Mr. STEVELLY, and the party he made here, that three Statutes of Bankruptcy are now in prosecution against the parties; and that the most vigorous and vigilant measures that ever was adopted on such occasions, for the recovery of money, have been resorted to through him, as will fully appear in a few days; and that after being in part the cause of much wretchedness in my concerns, so industriously employed is Mr. STEVELLY to get all he can out of this debt, which he would make it appear to his creditors was good for nothing, that since that statement, his brother in law has been actually taking an inventory of even the Kitchen rubbers, on another estate connected with that debt. Within a few days, how does his tone alter, to suit his fancy; before his failure, there was sixty shillings in the pound among the parties on those bills, and they now turn out be good for nothing; and if Mr. STEVELLY was not obstinate, in not coming into arrangements with me, he would not now probably have cause to return me as his debtor.

I had considerable bill transactions with him, which consisted principally by my drafts on my Factor, a Mr. PARKS, in Dublin; the greater part of which was endorsed by my Father, for my accommodation, and his further security—PARKS suspended his use
