DARING ROBBERY.

We regret to learn, that at so early an hour as seven o'clock
in the evening of the 22d of December, the house of
Charles Going, Esq. of Alta Villa, within half a-mile of
Caher, was surrounded by a banditti, armed with blunder-
busses and pistols, in, as our informant states, "excellent
order and of a superior finish," who, after having forced
their way, proceeded to acts of the most wanton cruelty and
plunder. They several times put the family in imminent dan-
ger of their lives; and, after some unavailing resistance on the
part of the family, in which Mr. Going was wounded, but
we are happy to say, not dangerously, the robbers carried
off three watches, and other valuable property. Plunder ap-
pears to have been their only object. We understand they
afterwards proceeded to Mr. Doherty's, in that neighbour-

MYSTERIOUS BURGLARY—William Hookham, a res-
pectable young man, was brought up at the Mansion House,
London, on Saturday se'nnight, and underwent a final exa-
mination, charged on suspicion of burglariously entering the
warehouse of Mr. Eastman, of Thomas Street, and stealing
from thence an immense quantity of superfine cloths, which
had been deposited there for the use of the East India Com-
pany.—Hookham, it appeared, with three others, had been
employed in painting a dwelling house adjoining, from
whence a communication had been made into the warehouse
by breaking in the wall, opening several bales of cloth and
carrying the latter away. Mr. Chillingworth, belonging to
the premises, having discovered the depredation on Friday
morning, gave information to Richard Vince, the foreman,
who had the care of the warehouse. The latter conceiving
that suspicion fell most strongly upon the painters, gave
Hookham into custody, who very readily gave a full account
of himself and his working companions. A strict search
was instantly set on foot by Branscomb and other officers,
the result of which was, that Hookham and his companions
were men of exemplary characters, and to whom not the
slightest suspicion could attach, except as being employed,
two of them before Christmas, and Hookham only a few
hours on Friday morning in painting the dwelling house.—
The Lord Myor having asked Vince, the foreman on the
premises, some questions, ordered Hookham to be discharg-
ed, at the same time expressing his conviction that the bur-
glary must have been effected by some individuals well ac-
quainted with the situation of both the dwelling and ware-
house, and trusting that by the activity of the prosecutor and
the officers, the delinquent might yet be discovered.

On New-Year's Day, a dreadful riot took place at the fair
of Mullagh, in the West of the Co. Clare. Two factions,
the Sextons and the Darcys, met to decide an old party
dispute, and did not desist until many were severely beaten
and injured.—Previous to the riot, the Rev. Mr. M'Gowan,

manner, he entreated them to begin the New Year peaceably,
to forget all party animosities, and to live in peace and
harmony, always having the precepts of God before them.
