Extract of a letter from a member of Congress, dated New-York, Oct. 13, 1785.
"The account that you will see in the enclosed paper of a war being declared against us by Algiers, is, I believe, too well founded, and renders it necessary that our merchants should be apprised of it, and be on their guard. This day Congress had a letter from Paul Jones, dated at l'Orient, the 6th of August last, confirming the above account, and both communications are directed by Congress to be sent to the executives of the different states for the public information."
The following is a copy of a letter wrote by the American Captains, who are captives at Algiers, which was forwarded by the British consul, to Richard Harrison, Esq; consul for the United States at Cadiz. It is

Extract of a letter from New York, Sept. 17.
"The crew of a whaling brig belonging to Mr. R. Crowne, of this city arrived here a few days since from St. Lucia, where they had put in on their return from their voyage, for water, &c. and were seized, and the vessel and cargo condemned and sold. There were 2 other vessels besides the above brig, belonging to the States, sold the same day with her."
Extract of a letter from St. Eustatia, Sept. 28.
"The greatest piece of cruelty I ever heard of, was perpetrated at Nevis very lately, an American vessel, I believe from the Northward was drove on that island in the gale, she was seized and condemned in a Court of Admiralty and sold because she was so unfortunate as to get on that island, and was not a British bottom."
