

every creditor. They had been unfortunate, and, perhaps, wanted prudence, but they relied that their prudence was unimpeached. The proposal that had been made for them was in the spirit of consideration for those that had suffered, and for their sake, it was to be regretted that the proposal was not accepted.

The general body of the creditors present seemed to participate in this feeling, and hopes were expressed perhaps, the gentleman who had sent for the commission would forego his determination. It was intimated that he could not, without involving the creditor whom he acted in a heavy responsibility, at that time was a guardian to Minors and in the event of accepting a compromise, he would be liable to the creditors.

Mr. Jacob Mark, Esq. who had been a most efficient member of the committee appointed to enquire into the affairs of the firm, expressed his conviction, that they would not be so productive under the commission, as under the trusteeship which had been proposed; and as the trusteeship coincided with him. It being understood by the creditors coincided with him. It being understood that the professional agent to the petitioning creditor was in the room, there was a general wish to know his intentions.

Mr. J. C. Besnard, the gentleman alluded to, came forward, and most candidly and honourably explained the steps that had been taken. It was true that the commission had been issued out, but it had not yet been taken down in consequence of the absence from Dublin of the Lord Chancellor; but he was in hourly expectation of receiving it. He distinctly stated, that those whom he acted (eight or nine in number) were not influenced by any vindictive feelings towards Messrs. Kelly; on the contrary, they were convinced of their integrity, and were disposed in every way to do their wishes, by coinciding in any plan that could track out, with that object in view, and consistently to their own claims. That, however, which had been proposed, as it was not likely to meet with unanimous support, which was necessary to carry it into commission, could not attain the object, and it was to avoid the evils and accidents attended upon delay, that they had acted as they had done. Mr. Besnard stated, that the agent in Dublin, to whom he had written, had been since waited on, by a professional gentleman, the part of other creditors, to issue the Statute, till, however, he was willing to listen to any plan which would obviate the necessity of proceeding on the Statute.

Mr. J. Bennett, who had also sent for the Statute, professionally, proposed to ascertain the sentiments of every creditor individually, by writing to them; but it was found that there were some of them living in the island, Guernsey, &c. and delay, which might be serious, would take place before their answers could be received. It seemed, then, to be the general opinion, to let the commission proceed, and upon proof of debts under it, if the creditors then assented, by getting a certain proportion in amount, to sign, to get it superseded. The meeting separated without having come to any fixed determination, but with the feeling we have mentioned.

#### MESSRS. GILES' BANK.

On Monday last, a meeting of the creditors of this bank took place at the Crown Tavern. One of the trustees, who had been originally appointed, having declined acting, Walter Giles, Esq. was appointed trustee. Mr. Giles stated, that though he understood the trust, yet, from his unacquaintance with the business, he wished the assistance of some gentlemen who were qualified from their knowledge to direct him in managing the affairs of the bank—John Leslie Esq. S. Perrott, Esqrs. having been called on by the meeting, declared their readiness to assist Mr. Giles with their best exertions for the advantage of the estate, declining, however, any responsibility. A statement of the affairs of the bank was then read by Mr. Allen, Esq. by which we were much gratified to receive the very favourable results which may be expected: particularly under the direction of so highly respectable and intelligent Gentlemen.
