The Marquess of Conyngham continues at the family at Slane Castle, Meath.
The house of Mrs. Warner, Hanover-place, Great George-street, Cork, was burglariously entered on Monday morning, and robbed of a quantity of apparel and furniture.
The official intelligence has been received (of what announced last post) that the *Navarino*, which sailed from Cork on the 12th May last, with Government emigrants, selected from the South of Ireland, arrived at Sydney, on the 19th August. The most satisfying account is given of the health and conduct of the people during the voyage, not one of whom died; and they were stated all to have the prospect of early employment, on favourable terms.
The Cork Harbour Commissioners have procured a powerful dredging machine for deepening the flats, enabling vessels to sail at early tide. They are about to erect a crane on the quays, sufficient for all commercial purposes, not being allowed the use of cranes at the Custom-house, and to memorial the Treasury, for leave to import mahogany at same duty as oakwood.
The election of a Medical attendant to the Cork Dispensary, is fixed for the 17th February.
The largest sum to be paid to a Physician appointed to any poor-house in Ireland is £60 per annum.
Two Police stations in the county of Longford—namely, Aughadowry and Cornafuncheon, are given up.
Several farm houses in Kerry were unroofed by the late storm, and one house near Tralee was absolutely blown off the ground!
An old pauper, aged 103 years, died in the House of Industry, Cork, this week.

We have just learned from a most respectable source, that an express had overtaken the Army of Hindus, under General Lord Keane, with the start-ling intelligence, that Dost Mahomed, the Usurper, unexpectedly re-appeared with a strong armed force in the vicinity of Ghuznee, and threatened to re-possess himself of that fortress. The retro-march of our troops was instanter countermanded and we are to be prepared by forced marches for another visit to Ghuznee, in order to protect it from the hostile demonstration of Dost Mahomed's numerous followers.
