

the spirit of the constitution; too independent of administration; and to bestow little or no patronage.—In the room of this we are to have, it seems, a Police Bill purely military in its constitution, summary as lightning in its power, and as liberal of Patronage as its friends could make it.

This new bill is said to be almost literally copied from that of Mr. Pitt's, which was of so abhorrent an aspect, as only to be permitted to shew its face for a few hours in the English House of Commons the beginning of last session.

The clause in the Revenue bill, it is confidently said, will be firmly supported by the officers of the crown, notwithstanding the inconveniencies which have already arisen from it.—This makes the attendance of the independent Members more necessary.

A correspondent thinks it would be right to publish the names of those County Members who do not attend their duty on the above occasion, that their constituents may be properly acquainted with the obligations they owe them, which will no doubt be serviceable on any future general election.

Extract of a letter from London, Jan. 21.
"Yesterday, a messenger arrived from Paris at the Secretary of State's office, with a copy of the commercial arrangement between this country and France, as some are of opinion; or, as others assert, some dispatches relative only to that negociation, which, however, at the least, contain some intelligence no way disagreeable on the subject."

On Monday the 2d of January, a detachment of the 15th regiment, under the command of Captain Madden, marched from Wexford, with John Heatly, Esq; High Sheriff of the county, to take possession of some houses and lands near Camolin, held forcibly for these six years past, and which had been in vain attempted to be taken at several times by the High Sheriffs of the county; after a severe march they arrived there on Tuesday about noon, when they found that they had intelligence of their coming, and were informed that upwards of thirty of the most desperate, well-armed, had prepared to make a defence from the house; it was first agitated to storm it, but imagining it might be attended with some slaughter, they with much difficulty set fire to the house. When near burned, the High Sheriff and military repeatedly offered them quarters if they would surrender, but was as repeatedly told they would to a man die first; when the house was near consumed, they made a sally from the house, well-armed, but the military soon secured the principal, at the moment he had presented at one of the officers; and one man in attempting to fire on the military, was shot through the heart. Possession was taken and given the right owner, Mr. John Burkitt, and the military returned about nine same evening, without any further accident, to Ennisworthy.
