DEATH OF MR. W. L. GULLEN.

Numerous friends in the city have heard with deep regret of the death of Mr W. L. Gullen, which took place at his residence, Roche's Street, early yesterday morning after a brief illness. Like his father, the late Mr W. H. Gullen, he was for many years an official in the concern of Messrs Matterson and Sons, where he occupied the position of overseer in the bacon curing department, and was held in high regard by the firm and by the staff. He served with the Pal's Division in the Great War, and was gassed, and this affected his health. In his day he was a keen footballer, and he was an old member of the Protestant Young Men's Association. His premature demise is deeply regretted, and sincere sympathy is expressed with his mother, sisters, and other members of the family in their keen sorrow.
