PROPOSALS FOR FOYNES.

Meghen, County Manager, in reply to a number of proposals relative to housing, lighting and the provision of a swimming pool for Foynes, which the Association had placed before him. MORE LIGHT NEEDED AT DRUMCOLLOGHER

While greatly pleased at and highly appreciative of the extension of the Shannon current to Drumcollogher and mindful of the numerous restrictions imposed during the emergency period (writes our Drumcollogher correspondent) the townspeople would like to see an improvement in the matter of public lighting. The six lamps allotted for street lighting are somewhat inadequate and, coupled with none too perfect spacing of the lights, leaves a portion of the town in darkness. Three additional lamps, one in the Square, one at the creamery, and one at the Newcastle Road entrance, would suffice to remedy the defect, and it is to be hoped that in due course the matter will receive due consideration.
