He frequently addressed the Archdiocesan Fraternity attached to the Redemptorist Church at Mount St. Ann's, Limerick, and his sermons were invariably looked forward to as something particularly worth hearing. To his father and the other members of the family and their numerous relatives we extend our very sincere sympathy on their great sorrow. His obsequies for the repose of his soul took place at 11 o'clock on Wednesday last at the Redemptorist Church, Limerick, and the funeral took place immediately afterwards in the Crypt under the Altar.

LIMERICK 1921 MURDER RECALLED

The funeral took place on Wednesday to the cemetery adjoining Grange Church, the cortege being large and representative.

SCENES INVESTIGATED

While a meeting of Limerick County G.A.A. Board was held in St. Ita's Hall, Thomas Street on Saturday last for the purpose of receiving notices of motion and nominations for the annual convention, a special committee, composed of officers and members of the Board, sat in another part of the building and carried out an investigation into the scenes which occurred at Kilmallock some months ago following the play-off of the county junior hurling between Feenagh and Pallasgrange. Punch, P.P. (outgoing); vice-chairman, Mr. O'Reilly (outgoing), Mr. M. Nevin, secretary, Mr. S. O'Connell; treasurer, Mr. M. Fitzgibbon; representatives on Munster Council, Mr. Gleeson and Mr. T. Ryan.
