We regret to announce the death on yesterday  
morning at the Convent of the Franciscan Chapel,  
Henry-street, the Rev. M. B. Cosgrave, O.S.F. This  
respected young Clergyman was a native of Lime-

Rome. He was first attached to the Church of his  
order in Dublin, but for the last three years was on  
the mission in Limerick, where his zeal and assiduity  
in the discharge of all the Clerical duties won him the  
esteem and respect of all who knew him. The funeral  
took place at two o'clock this day from the Chapel,  
and was accompanied to the new Cemetery at Mount  
St. Laurence, by a very large body of Clergy, and a  
numerous and highly respectable concourse of Citizens  
of every class.

By the circular just addressed by the Archbishop of  
Vienna to the clergy of his diocese we learn:—1.  
That the Archbishop is empowered by the Pope to re-  
move by "dispensation" the prohibition of marriage  
between Catholic and non-Catholic Christians. 2.  
That the dispensation will only be granted when it  
appears certain that all the issue of a mixed marriage  
will be educated in the Catholic religion. 3. If the  
bridegroom, being a non-catholic, promises to have all  
his children brought up in the Catholic faith, the  
priest will perform the marriage ceremony, but if he  
refuse to give such promise, and his affianced bride  
persists in her resolution to enter into a matrimonial  
engagement with him, then the Papal Brief of May 22  
1841, comes in force, and "the parish priest shall re-  
ceive the declaration of their resolve to marry in the  
presence of two witnesses, but shall carefully avoid  
giving to the act the appearance of an ecclesiastical  
ceremony."
