**AGRICULTURAL BANK.**

Copy of a Letter received from the Solicitor of the English Shareholders of the Agricultural Bank, enclosing Resolutions published at a Meeting held in Manchester on the 7th of January, both of which demand the prompt attention of the Irish Shareholders.

Wolverhampton, 8th January, 1842.

DEAR SIR,

I inclose you a copy of the Resolutions of yesterday, and I trust that the Shareholders of the Agricultural Bank in Ireland will feel the consideration with which your and Mr. Maunsell's exertions for them have been met, and one and all come forward without one instant's delay in proportion to their interest in this mismanaged concern. I cannot for a moment doubt their doing so, not only from a sense of justice and duty, but as the only mode of saving themselves from ruin; but it is a necessary matter of business for me to add, in the most emphatic, unequivocal, and final terms, that every individual, without exception, who does not do so, must be prepared to take the consequence of his default. There cannot be another moment's trifling in this matter.

At a Meeting of Shareholders of the Agricultural Bank of Ireland, held at Manchester this 7th day of January, 1842, to meet a Deputation from Ireland, consisting of Mr. Pim and Mr. Maunsell, WILLIAM SMITH, Esq. in the Chair.

Resolved—That, relying upon the representations made by the gentlemen from Ireland as to the expediency of collecting the necessary funds there *pro rata*, rather than by a call of £300 from each individual, and upon their assurances that such collection will be made in sufficient time to meet the proportion of the liabilities which ought to be borne by the Irish Shareholders, and shall be so faithfully applied, it is the opinion of this Meeting that the Shareholders in Ireland should at present pay only *pro rata*, and should not be interfered with so long as the Committee in Ireland shall pay the liabilities, in the proportion aforesaid, to the satisfaction of the Chairman of this Meeting.

That this proportion of liabilities, with reference to their discharge by the respective Committees in Dublin, and by the English Shareholders, is to be calculated according to the total amount of stock held by parties resident in Great Britain and in Ireland respectively; and that, in order to enable the latter to keep this engagement made by the Irish Committee, they be allowed to retain for the above purposes all funds arising from arrears of calls on Irish Shareholders resident there, and other assets, until the liabilities are discharged; and then the due proportions of such assets are to be a matter of general account between the Shareholders at large.
