BALLYSHANNON.

REPORT upon the Proposed Municipal Boundary of the BOROUGH OF BALLYSHANNON.

THE ancient Borough comprises part of the Parishes of Kilbarron and Innis- ANCIENT LIMITS. macsaint. It was granted a Charter by King James the First. The extent of this Boundary could not be ascertained, even by the oldest inhabitant on the spot.

The Town of Ballyshannon is situated at the mouth of the River Erne, and is DESCRIPTION OF a sea-port. The greater portion of the Houses is on the right Bank of the THE TOWN. River. On the left Bank there are Salt Works and a Distillery. The Town has increased within the last five years.

The Population amounted in 1831 to 3,775. Some increase, it is stated, has Population. taken place since that period.

The Kilbarron Parish Cess amounted to 30 l. 13s. for the last year, being equal Local Rates. to a rate of about $4\frac{1}{2}d$. in the pound, upon an old valuation of property.

The Kilbarron County Cess for the last year is about 12s. in the pound, upon a County Rates. valuation of the Lands, &c., made in 1724.

The County Cess for the lower third of the Parish of Innismacsaint is about 14s. in the pound for the last half year, upon an old valuation of the lands, &c.

The following Boundary is recommended as embracing the whole Town of Ballyshannon, and an area sufficiently large for any probable extension:—


From the Point (1) at which the Townland Boundary between Port Nassau Proposed and Dunmuckerum meets Ballyshannon Harbour; thence, Southerly, along Boundary. the said Boundary till it meets the Sligo Road (2); thence, Easterly, to the South-east Angle of the High Wall of the Tan Yard (3), belonging to Mr. Arlingham; thence, in a straight Line, North-easterly, to the Roman Catholic Chapel (4); thence, in a straight Line, in a South-westerly direction, to Rockville House (5); thence, in a straight Line, in a Northerly direction, crossing the River Erne to Camp Lane Cabins (6), where the Boundaries of the Townlands, Ballyshannon, Camp and Coolcolly meet in a Point; thence up Camp Lane and along the Boundary between Ballyshannon and Coolcolly, to the Donegal Road; and along the Donegal Road about Eighty Yards on the same Boundary, South-westerly, to a Stone Bridge (7); thence, Westerly, in a straight Line to the Junction of the two Roads leading from Abbey Island to Ballyshannon, at Cloghan (8); thence, to the North-west Side of Damby House (9); thence across the Ballyshannon Harbour to the Point first described.

The Population within the proposed Limits will amount to about 5,000.
