## BANGOR.

REPORT upon the Proposed Municipal Boundary of the BOROUGH of BANGOR.

THE ancient Limits of this Borough include the Town and a small surrounding Ancient Limits. District locally termed "the Corporation." The Boundary Line is very irregular and is in extent about eight miles, embracing an Agricultural District.

The Town of Bangor, in the Parish of Bangor and Barony of Ards, is situated upon the Southern shore, and near the entrance of the Lough of Belfast, and is distant from the Town of Belfast about ten miles.

DESCRIPTION OF THE TOWN.

There are two Cotton Factories established here, and the Town is stated to be improving in its trade and circumstances.

The Population amounted in 1831 to 2,741; some increase, it is stated, has Population. taken place since that period.

It is estimated that there are 127 Houses within the Borough, of the annual value of 5l. and upwards.

The Parish Cess for the present year amounts to 58l. 11s. 1d., being equal to Local Rates. a Rate of about  $1\frac{1}{2}d$ . per tenement of 30 feet front; it is levied for the support of Foundlings, and for burying the deceased Poor.

The Town and Corporation of Bangor is assessed to the County 691. 6s. 7½d. County Rate. for the last year, being equal to a rate of about 1 s.  $0 \neq d$ . per acre. Houses are assessed in proportion to their size, those of 30 feet front, on a ground flat, at the same rate as an acre of Land.

The following Boundary is recommended, as embracing the whole Town of Bangor, and an area sufficiently large for any probable extension:—

From the Point (1) where the Old Belfast Road joins the Bangor Bay Proposed Shore at a place called the Old Pound; thence up the Centre of the said Road to Mr. Gilbert Cumming's House (2), on the Bryan's Burn Bridge Road; thence in a straight Line across the Ash Lonar, or Ash Lane, to the Junction of Clonaghan Lane and the Mail Coach Road to Belfast (3); thence, Easterly, to the South-east Angle of the Churchyard Wall (4); thence across Bangor Castle Park to the South Angle of the Orchard Wall in said Park (5); thence in a straight Line to the Centre of the Northern Gateway of the said Park (6); thence in a straight Line to the Junction of the Broad Lonar, or Broad Lane, with the Donaghadee Road (7) at about Two hundred Yards to the Eastward of the Point at which the Road to Groomsport branches off; thence, Northerly, in a straight Line to the East Side of the Lime Kilns (8), now in the occupation of Mr. Arthur Seay; thence, Westward, along the Bangor Bay Shore, to the Point first described.

The Population within the proposed Limits will amount to about 3,000.
