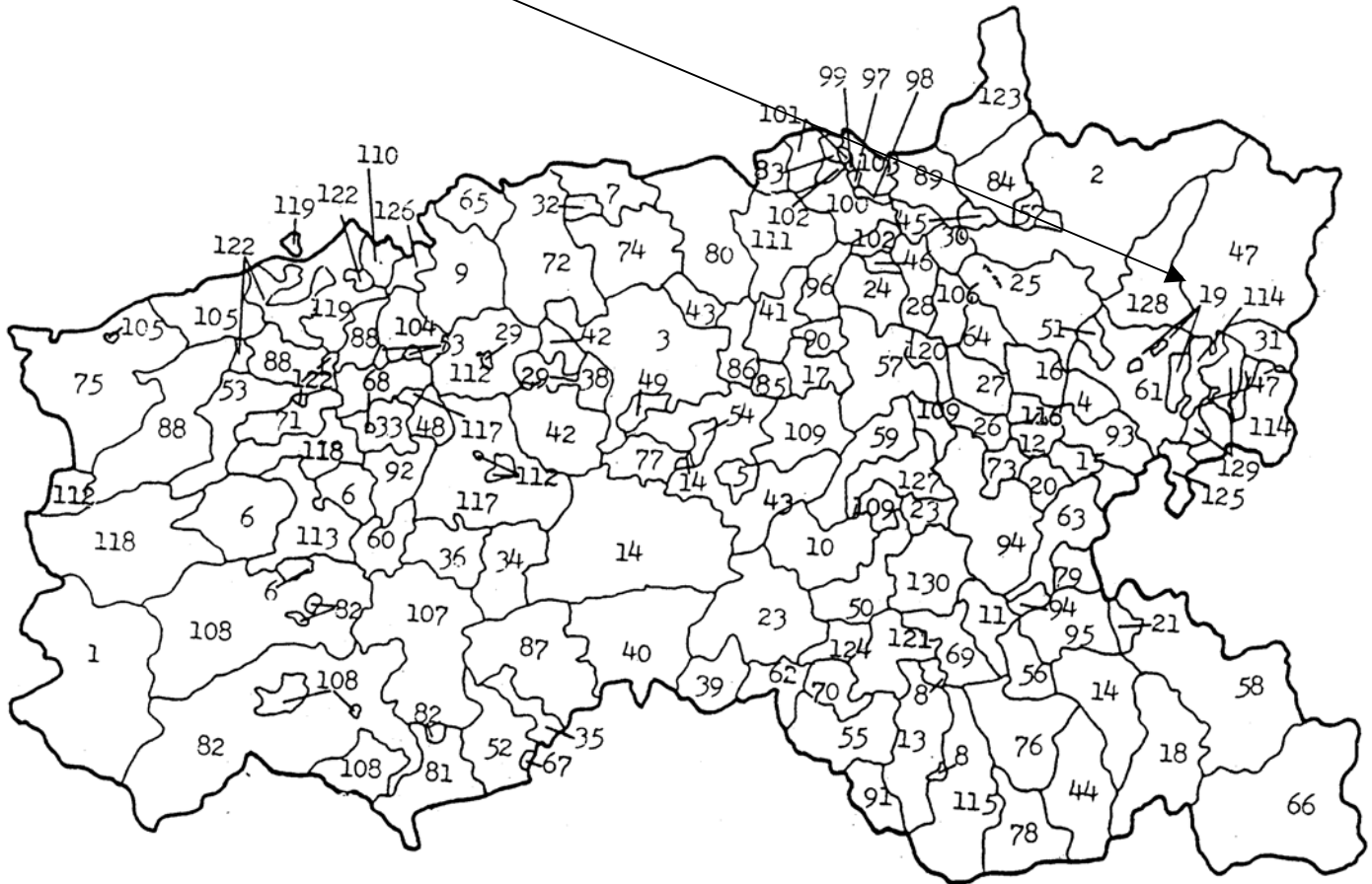

Situated in the E. end of the County and about 10 miles E. of the City of Limerick. It is in three parts. The first is bounded on the E. by part of the ph. of Oola & the td. of Plakaraka; S. by the td. of Gortnacoolagh; W. by Race, Garrison and Kilduff; and N. by Oola Ph. The second part is bounded on the E. & N. by the td. of Nicker; W. by Ballyvoneen & Bunavie; and S. by Bunavie and Nicker. The third part is bounded on the N. by Bunavie; on the W. by Ballytrasna; on the S. by Glin; and on the E. by Nicker tds.

The first of these portions is level, is about 2 m. long,  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile broad, & contains 8 townlands. The second, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile W. of the first, contains but one townland; and the 3rd portion, which is about a mile W of the first and a quarter mile S. of the second, contains 2 townlands, is nearly circular, and is a hill and good pasture ground.

Situated in the S. end of the parish, and is bounded on the E., W. and S. by Grean Parish; on the N. by Ballyhurst Td.

This td. contains 283 a., which are arable and without limestone. Soil deep, producing potatoes, corn, flax, and some wheet. The proprietor, Maurice C. Moore, Esq., has it let to 15 tenants, 8 of whom with leases of 21 years and the rest at will; all at £ 3 13s. to £2 7s. per acre, and in farms of 40 to 1½ acres. County Cess generally 1/2 per acre ½ yearly, and tithe 1/1 per acre. Bog used for fuel is very scarce and is bought by the tenantry. The prevailing names are "Ryans".

Situated in the E. end of the parish. Bounded on the E. by Cola Ph.; W. by Kilduff Td.; N. by Tulla Td.; and S. by Ballynaclogh Td.

Contains 51 acres, which are arable and without limestone. Soil partly light, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors, "Governors of Schools founded by Erasmus Smyth, Esq.", have it let per their agent Jas. J. Poe, Esq. to Darby O'Grady, Esq. by a lease ending in May 1840, and he again for same tenure to 5 tenants at £3 to £4 per acre. County Cess half yearly per acre generally 1/4 to 1/6. Tithe 1/- per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

Situated in the N. of the parish. Bounded on the E. by Cola Ph.; W. by Mountcatherine Td.; S. by Tulla Td.; and N. by the td. of Dromlara in the ph. of Grean.

This td. contains 141 a., which are arable and without limestone. Soil very light, producing potatoes, corn & flax. The proprietors, the "Governors of Schools founded by Erasmus

Smyth, Esq.", have it let per Jas. J. Poe, Esq., Agent, to Darby O'Grady, Esq. by a lease ending May 1840, and he again for same tenure to 15 tenants in farms of 22 to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres at £3 to £1 10s. per acre. Co. Cess generally  $\frac{1}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{8}$  per acre half yearly, and tithe 8d. per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

Situated in the S. end of the parish. Bounded on the E. by the ph. of Grean; on the W. and S. by Ballynaclogh td.; and on the N. by Ballynaclogh td.

This Glebe contains 7 acres which are arable and without limestone. Soil partly deep, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor, Archdeacon Pakenham, has it let per his agent, Thomas Apjohn, Esq., to 4 tenants by leases "during proprietor's term" at £2 2s. per acre. Tithe  $\frac{1}{10}$  per acre. Co. Cess none. Bog used for fuel is very scarce and bought by the tenantry.

An isolated townland of the parish. Bounded on the E., W. and S. by the ph. of Grean; and on the N. by the td. of Lackanascarry.

Contains 67 acres which are arable without limestone. Soil light and gravelly, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor, General Bourke, has it let to one tenant by a lease of three lives at £2 15s. per acre. Co. Cess generally  $\frac{1}{4}$  to  $\frac{1}{8}$  per acre half yearly, and tithe  $\frac{1}{6}$  per do.

Contains 252 acres which are arable with limestone in it.

Soil partly deep, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietor is the "Governors of Schools founded by Erasmus Smyth, Esq." who has it let per Jas. J. Poe, Esq., Agent, to Mrs. Fitzmaurice Hunt by a lease ending in 1840 at £1 11s. per acre, and she again on same tenure at £3 per acre. Co. Cess generally  $1/7$  per acre, and Tithe 2s. per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

An isolated townland of the parish, situated in the W. end of Grean parish, and bounded on the E., W., and N. by Grean Ph. and on the S. by the td. of Gortnanuv.

Contains 89 acres, which are grazing and pasture land. Soil light and rocky and without limestone. The proprietor, Gen. Bourke, has it let per his agent Dan. Barrington, Esq. to one tenant by a lease of one life or 31 years at £2 10s. per a. Co. Cess generally  $1/4$  to  $1/6$  per acre half yearly. Tithe 2s. per do.

Contains 84 acres of arable land with limestone in it. Soil deep, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors the "Governors of Schools founded by Erasmus Smyth, Esq." have it let per their agent Jas. Poe, Esq. to one tenant by a lease ending in May 1840 at £3 per acre. Co. Cess generally  $1/7$  per acre half yearly, and Tithe 2s. per do.

Apjohn, Esq. has it let by a lease for ever at 2/6 per acre to Michael Smithwick Esq., and he again to Henry Smithwick Esq., by a lease of lives renewable at £5 per acre. Co. Cess generally 1/4 to 1/8 per acre half yearly, and Tithe 1/8 per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce

Contains 19 acres, which are arable without limestone. Soil deep, producing potatoes, corn, flax, and some wheat. The proprietor Maurice C. Moore, Esq., has it let to one tenant by a lease of one life or 21 years at £3 13s. 10d. per acre. Co. Cess generally 1/4 to 1/8 per acre half yearly, and Tithe 2s.6d. per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

In the E. end of the parish. Bounded on the E. by Oola Ph.; on the W. by Kilduff Td.; on the N. by Ballyluddy Td.; and on the S. by the townland of Ballyhunt.

Contains 69 acres which are arable and without limestone. Soil light, producing potatoes, corn and flax. The proprietors the "Governors of Schools founded by Erasmus Smyth, Esq." have it let per their agent Jas. J. Poe, Esq. to Darby O'Grady, Esq. by a lease ending in May 1840, and he again for same tenure to 9 tenants at £3 to £3 10s. per acre. Co. Cess generally 1/4 to 1/8 per acre half yearly, and Tithe 1/- per do. Bog used for fuel is very scarce.

The Infants' Fort (Eng.)

In the td. of Ballyluddy, near the centre of the E. boundary thereof and attached to the N. side of the old road leading to Cluggin, etc.

It is a small circular fort, about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains in diameter and 2 feet high, with a green level surface and composed of earth. It is on low ground, and was used formerly for a burial ground for infants, from which reason it received its name. The practice is now discontinued.

Situated in the W. part of Ballyhurst td. and W. of Boher an Airgid.

It is a circular fort about 3 chains in diameter and 2 feet high, composed of earth, with a green flat surface, and round which are a few hawthorn bushes. It is placed on a flat low plain, from which can be seen Raheennagauragh, etc.

It is a spring well of good water. It received its name from being near the Church.

Situated on the middle of the S. boundary of Ballynaclogh Td., attached to the W. side of Boher an Airgid and also west of the Glebe.

This is a small burial place, about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  chains in diameter, being nearly circular. It is placed in a green field, on a small eminence enclosed in the centre of which is a small ruin, the wall now standing being about 4 feet high and 12 feet in length.

Situated near the centre of the parish, leading directly north from Barna Village to Ballyluddy townland, where it joins the Limerick and Tipperary Road, in its course passing through the townlands of Plakaraka, Ballynaclogh, Ballyhurst, Kilduff and Tullabeg.

This road, which leads from Emly, etc, passes through Ballyneety, the townland in which King William's army lay when surprised by General Sarsfield, who destroyed the siege train intended for the siege of Limerick. It was on this occasion, 'tis said, that the native inhabitants ran and hid a treasure on this road, being then a most desolate place. Ever since it goes by the above name.

The Castle of Kilduff

Is a castlelike house with barbicans at the corners. Its east side is totally destroyed, and its north side nearly so; but its west and south sides are in tolerable preservation. Its windows would indicate it to be an erection of the reign of James I.

The walls are 6 to 7 feet thick. The west and south walls are each surmounted by a chimney. There is a breach in the west gable, extending from near the ground to the top of the window which lighted the second floor.

The house is 5 stories high.
