quer of Ireland, to acquaint you, for the information  
of the Trade, that under the directions of the Lords  
of the Treasury of Great Britain, the Commissioners  
of Customs there have prepared for their Lordship's  
consideration, a Draft of a Clause for allowing Draw-  
backs on articles of Irish Manufacture, imported into  
Great Britain, and re-exported thence, and in the mean  
time, until the pleasure of Parliament shall be known,  
they have given the necessary orders for permitting the  
Exportation with Drawback.
