**ABERDEEN, JAN. 23.**—On Thursday last, after a very intense frost, a thaw commenced, with a gale from E. S. E. which, in the course of the night and yesterday, increased to extreme violence, occasioning the most tremendous sea on this coast we have witnessed for many years, and attended with the most melancholy consequences to several vessels belonging to this place, whose loss we lament extremely to state as too accompanied with circumstances of distress almost unex- ampled, of which no language can convey an adequate idea.

The demand for wheat at the Corn Exchange, Mark Lane, London, still continues, but our supply of English is very trifling, and higher prices are obtained for the little that appeared on Friday. Barley fully maintain's Monday's prices having but few arrivals of that grain. Oats and beans are 1s. per quarter dearer. In other articles there is no altera- tion.

Mr. James Sullivan of Mallow, has been admitted to the degree of Doctor of Medicine, of the University of Dub- jin (by Diploma), having undergone the proper examina- tions.

A case of some interest to the fraternity of Freemasons was decided on Friday last in the Palace Court, London, wherein Thomas Smith was plaintiff, and one Wm. Finch defendant. The plaintiff is a copperplate printer, and the action was brought to recover £4 2s. being the amount of work done for the defendant. A plea was set up by Finch, stating that the plaintiff was indebted to him £19 19s. 6d. for making him a mason, and giving him instruction in the various de- grees, in his independent lodge, at his own house near West- minster bridge. It was proved by the evidence of the Rev. Dr. Heming, past senior grand warden, as well as of Mr. White and Mr. Harper, joint secretaries to the grand lodge of masons, that the defendant was not authorised to make masons on the contrary, that his whole system was an imposition on the parties who were so deceived by him, and that no man had a right to make masons for private emolument. The trial occupied a considerable portion of time, and after an excel- lent charge from the Judge, that from the whole evidence it appeared that Finch's conduct was altogether unjustifiable, that he could neither make masons nor procure them admis- sion to any lodge, and that he was totally disavowed by the fraternity, the jury, without hesitation, gave a verdict against Finch, to the full amount of the printer's demand.

A large coppered schooner, with 5000 bushels of salt prize to the Young Wasp privateer, arrived at Ocracock early in December.

The Courtney, Hutton, from London to Pernambuco, taken by the Yankee privateer, arrived at Fairhaven 18th December.

The Protsen, Stokes, from the Havannah, which was taken 2d Dec. by the Kempt privateer, arrived at Charleston on the 8th. The Roselles, Beatson, also from the Havannah, and captured by her at the same time, was lost on the 7th, on Charleston Bar.

A vessel, supposed to be an outward-bound West In- dianman, was totally lost at Scilly on Friday night; 13 or 14 men were seen on a Rock, and it is supposed were saved. Several casks of porter and some porter barrels had been taken up.

A letter from Captain Bleuitt, of the Duke of Marl- borough packet dated 16th instant, states, that one of our brigs of war had been chased by two American ships of war into that port.

The Thames, from London to Aberdeen, was totally lost, with all the crew, in entering Aberdeen harbour, during a violent gale, on the 27th ult.

The Providence schooner and Caledonian brig, were driven on shore near Aberdeen, and only the master of the former saved.

The city of Aberdeen, from Sunderland, was lost on the 25th ult. on Holy Island; crew saved.

The Mercury, Davidson, of Blyth, from London was lost at the mouth of the Tyne on the 28th ult.

The schooner Brinnua, of St. John's Newfoundland, is taken by the Harpy privateer.

**STEAM BOAT.**—A new Steam boat is launched to run between London and Gravesend. It performed its first journey last week, against wind and tide, in 2 1/2 hours. The vessel is very commodiously fitted up, and capable of holding 300 persons. It consumes, during the voyage, half a chaldron of coal. The expence of each passenger is fixed at 2. 6d.; but it has the ad- vantage of landing its passengers without the aid of wherries, as it throws a platform from its side to the wharf—avoiding, thereby, not only the danger, but the extortion practised by the watermen.
