...78,000. from which savings a sinking fund

...Mr. Brownlow thought the two resolutions

...pearances; for if a reduction is proposed in  
...the civil list, the answer will be, that there it  
...is impossible; if the military, we shall be told  
...a war is not distant, so that in the civil and mi-  
...litary establishments nothing is to be expected  
...either in peace or war for a reduction. He  
...would advise less confidence in the number of  
...ministerial troops; and then proceeded to elu-
