DIED,

On Friday last, in Cork, that venerable Irish Prelate, the Right Rev. Doctor Moylan, R. C. Bishop. Exercising the arduous duties of a laborious ministry—occupied in the establishment of those various seminaries of learning and piety, which have so much contributed to the improvement of the country—unwearied in the diffusion of instruction—powerful in restraining vice—zealous in promoting virtue—disinterested in his views—disengaged from the world—uncommonly liberal to the poor, with a heart overflowing with tenderness and benevolence—firm and conciliating in the discharge of his pastoral duties—he lived esteemed, honored, and beloved by all who knew him, as his death is the subject of universal regret.

Doctor Moylan was son to an eminent merchant, formerly in the city of Cork, and was in the eightieth year of his age, as venerable a figure as we have ever beheld; his manners were courtly and polished, and to all the ease and elegance of the gentleman he added the dignity of the Bishop. He officiated as a Priest in that city during upwards of fourteen years, when in the year 1775 he was appointed Bishop of Kerry, being the first prelate for whose consecration the last Pope Pius VI. issued Bulls. After governing that diocese during eleven years, he was translated to Cork upon the resignation of the late Lord Dunboyne, and has during nearly thirty years been Bishop in his native city: he has seen two successors in the Diocese of Kerry, and witnessed the death of a valuable friend, whom he had appointed his coadjutor in the diocese of Cork.
