Patentee of Crow Street Theatre, with the kindest liberality proffered the Theatre, free of all expence, for one night, which was accepted of, and the feelings of the meeting for the value of the proposal, very warmly testified.

Monday evening last, a fellow of the name of Lee, was apprehended at Annigassan, county Louth, by the spirited exertions of Wm. McClinock, of Stonehouse, Esq. He is charged with various offences in this town and neighbourhood. An accomplice of Lee's named Mager, was also apprehended in this town, on suspicion of stealing a cow from a poor man, and committed to gaol by Ralph Smyth, Esq. for farther examination.—*Drogheda Journal.*

On the evening of Saturday last soon after it became dark, three men, one armed with a blunderbuss, and the other with pistols, robbed five or six country people on the road to Carrick-on-Suir, between the bridges of Waterford and Granagh. The Mayor having speedily received information of what was going on, left the house where he was dining, and, accompanied by some other gentlemen, all armed, proceeded to the place, and took every practicable measure for securing the offenders, but, unfortunately, without success.— One of the country people was robbed of £7, and the rest of what money and portable articles they had in their possession. The efforts of the gentlemen from this city had the effect of relieving from their apprehensions a great number of persons, who had remained near the Bridge Hotel, fearful of returning to their homes.

Monday se'night, the Rev. Samuel Stevenson, curate of Flixton, and J. Hepworth, a surgeon, has been found guilty at the Manchester Sessions of using unlawful means to make Hannah Edgely, the servant of the former, by whom she was said to be with child, miscarry. They were sentenced to three years imprisonment in Lancaster gaol. The trial lasted the whole of the day.

Last week Corrylongford Mill, near Colebrook, was entirely destroyed by fire, together with nearly 100 sacks of meal therein, belonging to various persons in that neighbourhood. The fire, which took place during the night, had made such progress before it was discovered and the alarm given, as to render abortive all efforts to preserve any considerable part of the property. With the exception of a few sacks of meal wrested from the flames, the whole concerns, machinery, &c. were consumed. For the honor of humanity, and interested as we feel in the moral character of the county, we are sincerely rejoiced to learn that this disastrous occurrence originated solely in accident, though it was reported, in the first instance, to be the work of some malicious incendiary.—*Erne Packet.*

*Resolved*—That we view with the utmost regret and alarm, the present unexampled depreciation of all agricultural produce which tends not only to repress the industry of the Farmer, but to undermine the resources of the state.

That as the pressure of a war taxation has now been repaid by the termination of the conflict in which the Empire has triumphed, we trust that past sacrifices may entitle us to future protection.

That most earnest petitions be prepared for the House of Lords and Commons, respectfully praying their attention to the agricultural distresses of this part of the United Kingdom.

That we conceive a full and immediate protection of Butter from all foreign competition to be indispensably necessary to our prosperity.

That a repeal of the augmented Malt Tax, imposed during the last Sessions of Parliament, would be productive of the most important advantages, and that a wise encouragement of the introduction of Irish Provisions into the West India ports, would secure to our Merchants steady market, and to our Colonies an independent supply.

That whilst we rely most confidently upon the wisdom of the Imperial Parliament, we are determined not to relax in our individual efforts, recommending to Landlords an enlightened liberality, and to Tenants an industrious perseverance which may alleviate, though, they cannot remedy the distress of the times.

That our petitions be entrusted to the EARLS OF CLARE and LIMERICK, The Hon. WYNDHAM QUINN and Wm. OBELL, Esq.

That a Memorial be transmitted to the Lord Lieutenant, praying his Excellency to take into his most gracious consideration, the establishment of a Steam Ton Boat, between Kiltaloe & Shannon Harbour—thus rendering productive to the public—the enormous expenditure upon the Inland trade of Ireland, and opening a secure and expeditious communication between St. George's Channel, and the Atlantic Ocean.
