the duty on the importation or toreign nerrings was to be continue at ten shillings the barrel. In support of the petition he went over pretty much the same ground that he did the night before, and concluded with faying, that from the manner in which the petition was drawn up, he did not think it would militate against parliamentary rule, if it was re-

The Chancellor of the Exchequer admitted that the petition was guardedly and well drawn up, but still its principle was against a tax, and from that confideration, in his opinion, it

ought not to be received.

Mr. Chatterton faid, that he would vote for receiving the petition: he contended that the complaints of the merchants and traders of a city of fuch commercial confequence as Cork was, demanded the attention of Parliament.

Mr. Browne of the College spoke likewise, for receiving the petition, he faid the prayer of it was by no means unreasonable; it did not go to a prohibition, it prayed only for a regu-

lation,

Mr. Corry faid the conduct of Administration, in respect to petitions against grievances complained of, was by no means fatisfactory to him: he had offered a petition to the House the other day, which was refused. Are the people to be that out for ever, from approach in Parliament with their complaints; it was a fubject which he would bring forward, in order to have that point fettled.

Sir Lucius O'Brien declared the parliamentary usage to be-that petitions against laying on taxes were not be received, as the public bufinels might be thereby impeded: But petitions for regulations in matters of trade, or the modification of a tax, might be confidently received without departing from parliamentary

The Secretary of State coincided in opinion with the Hon. Member who spoke last, with respect to the order of Parliament, and faid, that the petition now offered, came firicily within the description of one that might be received. He by no means wished to infringe on the order laid down by the House; but he wanted to lay before them information on a Subject, which materially affected the commercial interest of the city which he had the honour to reprefent. Mr. Brownlow faid he would never rest 1atisfied, till the point respecting receiving petitions was lettled; - are we to debar the people from complaining of their grievances; there was a petition offered to the House a few days ago from the Printers, it only prayed for a modification of a tax, but it was refused! for his part, he would ever be for liftening and attending to the complaints of the people.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer begged leave to inform the gentlemen, that there was no question before the House, and that a great deal of time was lost in speaking about matters not regularly before them, and in order to bring on the bufiness of the nation, he would move the order of the day.
