FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT IN LONDON.

London, Saturday, January 26.
Half-past Seven, P. M.

This morning Mr. Pinckney received dispatches from his Government, consisting of a bulky pamphlet, in which all the recent documents respecting the negotiations with the French court are introduced.—We understand that no facts of public importance are transmitted, and that the republican ministers are anxiously waiting for the determination of this country on the important subject of the late proclamation. They will soon learn with surprize that the British court has come to no decision on the business.

Through the channel by which the dispatches were conveyed, we have received some additional New York, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Boston papers. The proceeding in congress contained in them informs us, that in the House of Representatives Mr. Mumford had presented a petition from sundry merchants of the former city.—The petitioners stated that they had ordered goods from England to a large amount; that the orders were given before they had any knowledge of the proposed renewal of the Non-Intercourse; that the goods were purchased from the manufacturers, and would probably remain in the hands of their agent in England at the risk of the American merchants. It was further said that a large part of the goods was actually paid for; that a small portion only could arrive before the 2d of February; and under these circumstances, they prayed for relief from the operation of the prohibitory law.—This petition was referred to the committee of foreign relations.

By a letter from New York, of the 13th December, we understand that the secretary to the treasury, Mr. Gallatin, has recommended that all goods ordered in England from America, and paid for prior to the 2d Nov. although arriving after the 2d February, should not fall within the purview of the Non-Intercourse act. We believe that an application has been made to place under the same circumstances such merchandise as may have been ordered and paid for by American merchants itinerant in London and Liverpool prior to the receipt of the intelligence of the president's proclamation of the 2d Nov.
