the last 31, January has been a mild month in the London district. On 25 consecutive days the temperature rose above the normal, and the 1st was the only day on which it did not rise to 40 degrees or higher at Kew. The 6th was one of the warmest January days on record, with a maximum of 56 degrees, equal to the normal for April. The temperature for the month was rather above the average for March and about four degrees above the ordinary January level. Down to Tuesday the sheltered thermometer at Kew had fallen to the freezing point or below on only five nights.

THE INCREASED USE OF CONCRETE.

The increased popularity of concrete for all types of structural work is evidenced by the production figures for Portland cement over the past few years.

In 1907 the use of Portland cement per capita in England was 111 lbs., in 1924 it reached 128.9 lbs., and the figure has increased annually until 1927 shows a return of 177.9 lbs.

The actual production of British cement in 1927 was 4,120,000 tons. Not only was there a bigger demand in the home market but there was also an appreciably increased demand in the export markets.

LATE MRS MITCHELL, HOSPITAL.

The death took place recently at Benrue, Hospital, of Mrs Edmond Mitchell. The deceased, who was in her 80th year, was in good health up to a week before her death.
