WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, February 1st—The opening week sale for the spring season of in-calf heifers and dairy cows was held on Tuesday, February 1st, with a limited entry as is usual, the number being 62 heifers and cows. The class was about average, including some useful and promising lots. The attendance of dairy proprietors was large and representative; a number being on the look out for top heifers. Steady trade all round, the promising lots drew sharp competition; anything with quality and showing "dairy" promise was readily bid for at full current rates; the choicer lots drew steady competition, with a ready exchange of top values. The demand for the thick, shaggy legged heifers, preferably roans, was most noticeable, and where colour and quality featured in this description the competition was sharp and quick. Dairy cows, mixed class, useful and promising cows enquired for and sold at late rates; old and secondary cows almost unsaleable. Trade during the day well maintained, with a practical clearance of heifers. Market for an opening sale was quite satisfactory. Top price for heifers went to Mr. Martin J. Hartigan, Bellview, Croom, £30, the runner-up being Mr. M. O'Connell, Tarbrook, Croom, who obtained for the heifers £29 each. Top price for dairy cows obtained by Mr. Jerh. Carey, Birdhill, Limerick, at £32 10s., and Mr. P. O'Loughlin, Hill Cross, Kilmallock, obtained £33.
