HOUSING AT ARDNACRUSHA.

An Ennis correspondent writes:—

A report in connection with the housing
problem at Ardnacrusha has been received
by the Clare Board of Health from Dr G. H.
Enright, medical officer in charge of the
district. The general surroundings, he says,
are favourable with the exception of one
part, which requires the immediate atten-
tion of the Engineer. This is known as
O'Grady's Yard, Blackwater. In this yard
workers have congregated, and brought
their wives and children with them. There
are 21 families residing in the place, or a
total of 94 men, women, and children. One
man was removed to hospital suffering from
typhoid fever. "The case of typhoid shows,"
says the doctor, "that the drainage requires
immediate attention, whilst the list of
families resident in the place makes it
obvious that the area is very congested."

DEATH OF AN OLD CITIZEN.

after a brief illness. Deceased had been
out during the day, apparently in his usual
