Lieut.-General Sir R Darling, from the 41st Regt. is appointed Colonel of the 69th Regt. vice Vincent, deceased; Major General A'Court to the 41st, vice Darling; Major General D'Augilar to the 58th, vice Maitland, deceased; Major General W Napier, (late Lieut. Governor of Guernsey), to the 27th, vice Maclean, deceased. The following Major Generals have been passed over in the above list:—Cuyler, Turner, Loftus, Burrell, Aylmer, Riddell, Vernon, Hope, Harvey, St. Leger Hill, Williams, M'Donnell, Armstrong, Stovin, Campbell, Clarges, and Thomson. Eight of them are, however, on the staff. Major-General M'Donald, who for many years commanded the 92d Highlanders, is appointed to the staff at Jamaica, vice Lambert, deceased.

Major General Strutt, who commanded in this garrison in 1798, died on Sunday in Essex, aged 85 years. He was in the service 70 years. Major General Strutt held the sinecure office of Governor of Quebec.

Lieut. the Hon. J. L. Browne, 64th Regiment, has been appointed superintending officer of the Aberdeen Recruiting subdivision, in place of Lieut. Faulkner, 2d or Queen's.

The Depot of the 67th Regt. embark for the Isle of Wight at Cove of Cork on 17th inst.

Major de Salis, 8th Hussars, is on leave in this garrison.

Detachments of the 8th Royal Irish Hussars marched from Cork to Bantry, the 11th Feb., and arrive by the 13th, in charge of prisoners. Detachments of the 44th and 70th Regts., marched the 11th Feb, from Cork to Bantry with civil Prisoners, and will return with the convicted prisoners.

Lieut. H F Saunders, 84th Regt. Staff Officer, proceeds to London on short leave. Major Calder, Staff Officer of Pensioners, will perform duties during his absence.

A troop of the 6th Carbineers, under Capt. M'Kennon and Lieut. Foster, from Dundalk, proceeded on duty to Carrickmacross, on Tuesday, where a tenant-right meeting was held next day.

A troop of the Scots' Greys arrived yesterday at Athlone from Loughrea.

A company of the 73d arrived on Monday at Loughrea, and replaced the 2d Queen's.

Two officers of the 55th Regiment, quartered at Templemore, were fined £12 for entering the lands of Sir John Carden, Bart., in pursuit of game.

Lieut. Rigaud, 60th Rifles; Captain Grant Scots Greys; Captain Dickinson, 59th Regt.; Lieut. Stapylton, 13th Light Infantry, have joined the senior department at Sandhurst.

Capt. Hoey, 30th Regiment, will shortly be gazetted to a Majority.

An additional Regiment is to be sent to New South Wales and New Zealand.

The wife of Colonel Oldfield, of Royal Engineers, was found dead in her bed, at Plymouth, on Monday morning.

George White, private in the 6th Regt., was hanged on the 28th November, at the Cape of Good Hope, for the murder of Serjeant Jellie, of his own Regt. White suffered frightfully by the inexperience of the executioner—in fact he was hanged twice alive.

The 12th and 35th at the Mauritius, are about to return to England. The officers and soldiers were great favorites, and their departure will be a source of considerable regret to the inhabitants. The first division of the 5th Fusiliers arrived in the Resistance Frigate; but having the small pox on board, they were put under a quarantine of 40 days.

The Lord Bishop of Kilmore intends holding a general ordination on Sunday, the 19th of March.

The Dean and Chapter of St. Patrick's, Dublin, have the living of Clondalken now in their gift, value £400 a year.

The Lord Bishop has collated the Rev. John Evans Johnson, D.D. to the archdeaconry of Ferns, vacant by the death of the Ven. Edward Barton, late archdeacon, By Doctor Johnson's preferment, the prebend and parish of Kilrush, in the diocese of Ferns, become vacant.

EXECUTION OF JOHN RENEHAN.—Pursuant to sentence at the late Special Commission for this county, John Renehan, convicted of the murder of John M'Inerney, of Adamstown, underwent the extreme penalty of the law, on the drop of the county gaol, at two o'clock yesterday. On no previous occasion, within our recollection, did so small a concourse of spectators assemble outside the prison—indeed the crowd was so inconsiderable, that neither Dragoons or Infantry, though drawn up in the Artillery barracks, were called out to keep order, the city police, under Sub-Inspector Williams, being alone stationed within the iron paling of the gaol. Cars, horses, and pedestrians, passed up and down, without interruption, while the melancholy scene about to be enacted, was little thought of or reflected upon. On our way to the fatal spot, we were struck with horror, at beholding within view of the scaffold, and not more than 300 yards from the place of execution, a number of men and boys congregated in a field, where they amused themselves by killing rats, for which purpose dogs were engaged, and the greatest merriment prevailed. On entering the County gaol, we made enquiries about the unfortunate young man, whose untimely end was fast approaching, and were gratified to learn, notwithstanding the false rumours circulated, that he was exceedingly penitent, zealously devoted to prayer, and perfectly reconciled to suffer death for the crime of which he had been convicted. Soon after, the Sub-sheriff, Wm. Smyth, Esq. proceeded to the condemned cell, where Renehan was devoutly engaged in prayer with the Rev. Wm. Bourke, R. C. Chaplain, (whose zealous and unremitting attention to all the doomed victims, is unceasing, and to whose spiritual advice, assiduity, and devoted attention, aided by the Clergy of the City, is mainly attributable the extraordinary fortitude with which they meet death), Rev. James Ryan, Rev. J. Bunton, and Rev. John Quinlan. The procession then moved on to the scaffold, the clergymen being attired in canonicals. As it passed the tower, the wretched man, who carried a crucifix in his hands, was heard to respond in an audible tone, to the prayers of his spiritual directors, and walked with a resolute step to the scaffold, where he again knelt in devotion, after which the finisher of the law proceeded to perform his last revolting duty. The rope was adjusted around Renehan's neck—the cap placed over his face—the fatal bolt was drawn, and he died without a struggle. He made no declaration, either of guilt or innocence, in the gaol or on the scaffold, but we annex the following copy of a letter addressed to his step-Father, and written the morning of his execution:—

"County Gaol, Feb. 11th, 1848.
"JAMES RYAN—I told you and my mother on yesterday, that it was my wish and desire that my friends should not have any feelings of animosity or desire of revenge against the persons who were engaged in my prosecution. I hope you will make this my anxious desire known, as I freely forgive from the bottom of my heart all those who prosecuted me, as I hope that God in his great mercy will forgive me. I willingly accept of the death I am about to suffer in union with the sufferings of my blessed Lord and Redeemer Jesus Christ, in whose merits I place all my hopes. I deeply regret all my sins and offences, and implore every one who may read or see this to avoid every offence to God, and to serve Him alone who is deserving of all our love. I hope you will pray for my soul. I leave you all my blessing,—and may God bless you.

"JOHN RENEHAN."
On Thursday, the mother, step-father, and relations of Renehan, were permitted to take farewell of him in the prison, when the scene was truly affecting, and after execution they were again admitted to prepare his remains for interment within its walls. His family were comfortable and rather independent in circumstances, and it is to be deplored that such a youth should have committed an atrocious act, which brought him to an ignominious end. He was a man of firm mind, silent disposition, and exceedingly intelligent.

Hopes are entertained that the Lord Lieutenant will grant a reprieve to Michael Howard, under sentence of death in the county gaol, owing to the solemn declaration of innocence made by the unfortunate man, and the great exertions used on his behalf by the Rev. Mr. Bourke, R. C. chaplain of the prison.

This day a reprieve was received at Ennis gaol for James Hayes, who, with Patrick Ryan "Small," was convicted at the Special Commission of the murder of James Watson, Esq.

This day Denis Shehan was arrested by Constable Hardy, for attacking the Rev. Thomas Westropp, near Kilmurry, some months since. The watch stolen from Mr. Westropp, was found in the possession of Shehan.

On Wednesday night last, three sheep, the property of John Connors, of Highmount, were stolen from an out-house of his, and slaughtered in a field convenient to the place, the entrails left on the land. Constable Hamilton went in search of them, and succeeded, after a harassing march, on finding the skins and carcasses buried in a dunghill in the village of Feenaugh. On examining the flesh he found a knife stuck in a joint of meat, which was afterwards identified as the property of a notorious bad character named Daniel Donovan, who was taken into custody.
