non Steamship Co. and Messrs. Sut-
ton, Ltd., 3/- per week as from 24th
December; yardmen and storemen
employed by coal and shipping com-
panies, 3/- per week as from 24th
December; lorry drivers, helpers
and horse carters employed by the
Limerick Steamship Co., 3/- per
week as from 24th December. This
brings the bonuses in all these cases
to 8/- per week.
