

to do so with the financial resources at their command—but for the State to grapple with it by means of a loan. The Minister promised to give special consideration to the case put before him by the Wicklow County Council, and, no doubt, other county bodies will see the necessity also of putting their respective requirements before the Government. The Minister stated that he had already fully considered the issuing of a loan on the security of the motor taxes, but added that this is not a matter within his control. The Minister of Finance, however, will, no doubt, give the question of the loan his further consideration. It seems to be the only effective means of solving the problem, which is a pressing and an urgent one in the common interests of the country.

DEATH OF VERY REV. DEAN McNAMARA, V.G.

We regret to announce the death, which took place at the Deanery, Bruff, yesterday, of the Very Rev. Charles McNamara, P.P., V.G., Catholic Dean of Limerick, at the ripe old age of 87 years. He was ordained nearly 60 years ago, and having been a curate in the diocese for 15 years, was appointed Parish Priest of Stonehall, and subsequently of Effin. Thirty-two years ago Dean McNamara was translated by the late Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer to the pastorship of Bruff, where he laboured unceasingly up to a couple of years ago, when his health became impaired. He was held in the highest regard and esteem by all classes and degrees in the district, and his demise has in particular been heard of with deep regret by the Bishop and his brother clergy. Dean McNamara was one of the best-known priests in Munster, and was the oldest surviving member of an old Limerick family. He was brother of the late Mr D. P. McNamara, at one time Mayor of the City, and also of the late Mr Robt. McNamara, solicitor.
