DEATH OF DR J. F. COUNIHAN.

We regret to record the death, which occurred after a short illness, of Dr John F. Counihan, of Kiltrush, the sad event taking place at the residence of his son, Dr J. H. Counihan, Bindon Street, Ennis, on Sunday. The deceased gentleman, who was in his 77th year, was the last surviving son of the late Mr Francis Counihan, of this city, and founder of the "Munster News." Dr Counihan was brother of the late Ald. Jerome Counihan, J.P., for many years Editor of that journal, and Mayor of Limerick in 1882-'83 (during his Mayoralty the Sarsfield Bridge was freed from tolls), and also of the late Mr W. E. Counihan, solr. Dr Counihan when a young man took up practice in Kiltrush, where he had since resided. He was medical officer of Kiltrush Union, and ever took a kindly interest in the welfare of the inmates and the poor of the town and district. He was an old member of the Limerick Fishery Board. He was highly esteemed for his kindly and courteous manner, and there is deep sympathy with his family in their bereavement.

The remains were removed by road from Ennis yesterday afternoon to Kiltrush, and the funeral took place to-day for Shanakyle Cemetery, near that town.

Kiltrush Parish Court yesterday, on the motion of the Chairman, Mr Daniel McMahon, adjourned as a mark of respect to the memory of the late Dr Counihan, and of sympathy with his relatives. Messrs Ml Killeen and Ml O'Shea, solrs., Mr Ml Conyn, the District Inspector, Mr P Greene, Registrar, and Mr T J Blackall, C.P.S., joined in the tribute. Report in our next.

DEATH OF MAJOR IEVERS.

We regret to announce the death of Major Eyre Ievers which took place last night at his residence, Mount Ievers, Sixmile-Bridge. The deceased gentleman had only been ailing a week and, the immediate cause of death being pneumonia following an attack of influenza. He was in his fifty-fourth year, and married, leaving a widow and four children to mourn his loss. Major Ievers was son of the late Mr James Butler Ievers, Quinville Abbey, Quin, Co Clare, and Glanduff Castle, Co Limerick. He was an extensive landed proprietor, and served in the 5th Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers. During the recent war he was engaged on recruiting in the Limerick area. In Sixmile Bridge he was held in much esteem by the people, by whom his demise is greatly regretted.
