Situated about 2 miles south-east of Six-Mile-Bridge, Co. Limerick. It is bounded on the N. by the phs. of Caherelly and Rochestown; E. by Monasteranenagh Ph.; and on the S. by Knockainy and Killcullane phs. Contains 1.546 acres, statute measure.

The surface of this parish consists of two parallel chains of hills, the one richly pastoral, and the other verdant, and carpeted with limestone soil; and of an intermediate plain. traversed and much overflown by the river Comogue, and constituting what is provincially called corcass land.

Cahercorney Ph. (contd.)

Two-thirds of the parochial area are meadow and pasture. Lough Gur is on the western border.

Is the property of John Croker, Esqr., of Ballynaguard. Longford Bridge is situated on the barony and parish bound-ary, between the tds. of Ballingoola and Rawleystown. Ballingoola Paper Mill is situated on the barony and parish boundary, and on the north boundary of this townland. Knockfinnell Trigl. Station is about the centre of the townland.

In the N.E. extremity of the parish. Bounded on the N. by Caherelly Parish; E. by Herbertstown, in the ph. of Kilcullane; S. by Moohane td.; and W. by the td. of Rawleystown and Knockainy ph. Contains 719 acres. Arable

The property of John Croker, Esq., of Ballynagarde. About the centre of this td. is Cahercorney Church and burialground.

There was a castle here built about the time of James 1. by the Rawleys. It fell into decay, and became the property of the Croker family, who built a splendid house out of its ruins about 75 years ago. This house was afterwards sold to one of the labourers employed in building it for £200, and he immediately destroyed it, leaving it the ruin it is to-day.
