The following is a copy of a letter addressed to N. Beamish,
Esq. of Beaumont, near Cork, by Lieut. Colonel Proctor, in
consequence of the praise worthy exertions of the Cork Apollo
society, on behalf of the widows and orphans of the unfortun-
ate persons who were lost on board the Boadicea transport:
Kinsale, March 2.

Sir—I have the honor of acknowledging the receipt of
your letter, enclosing the sum of sixty two pounds, to be
divided among the widows and orphans of the non-commis-
sioned officers and soldiers of the 82d regt. who were unfortun-
ately lost off this coast by the wreck of the Boadicea trans-
port on the 31st of Jan last.

I embrace the opportunity, Sir, of expressing the high sense
entertained by every individual in the corps, of the liberality
of the Apollo Society on this melancholy occasion; and I beg
leave, with them, to return my most heartfelt thanks for their
generous endeavours to alleviate the wants and miseries of the
distressed.

of whom had employed sweeps to clean his chimney, and
the loose soot which they threw down, falling into Mr.
Foster's fire, an explosion took place, little short of what
would have been occasioned by a small quantity of gun-
powder. Unfortunately one of the sweeps a fine little boy,
was very much scorched.

Richard Morgan, of the parish of Mullabrack, near Market-
hill, was committed to the gaol of Arnaugh, on Saturday se'n
night on a charge of dealing in forged notes. He was, it is
said, particularly active in the last fair of Richhill.

We give the following statement as it has reached us:—
A few days since, a Roman Catholic Clergyman in the Co.
Cavan, was overtaken on his way home, by a man on horse-
back, who entered into conversation with him, and stating
himself to be a stranger in that part of the country, requested
he would direct him to some house in the village they were
then approaching where he could be safely accommo-
dated for the night.—When they came to the village, the
Priest pointed out a house to him, and rode on towards his
own residence, some distance from the village; he had not
gone far when he was again overtaken by the stranger, who
told him he was afraid to stay in the house he had directed
him to, as it was full of Orangemen; the Priest told him he
need be under no apprehension whatever, and advised him to
go back, which he declined, saying he would rather be on
the road all night. The Priest then told him, as his appre-
hensions would not let him return, he would give him a bed
and a place for his horse at his own residence, to which the
stranger assented; after taking some refreshment, they retired
to their apartments. The man servant of the Clergyman hav-
ing occasion to go into the stranger's bed-chamber before he
had gone to bed, observed under his great coat a blunder-
buss. On quitting the room, which he did instantly, he
went to his master and told him he did not like his guest; that
he was armed, and probably had bad intentions; his master,
upon his statement, desired him not to go to bed, but to arm
himself with a pitchfork, and sit up in the kitchen; while he
at the same time loaded a case of pistols, and sat up himself
to beguile the time. In the dead of the night the Priest's
door was opened, and the man whom he had sheltered enter-
ed the room, presented the blunderbuss, and desired
him to deliver his money or he would shoot him; the
Clergyman requested he would put down the blunderbuss
lest it might accidentally go off, and that he would shew him
what money he had; the Priest then threw on the table a few
tenpennies, saying that was all the money he had; on which
the other replied, he knew he had plenty of money, and that
he came for the purpose of getting it and that if he had not
brought him to his house, he would that night have broken
into it; the Priest then told him what money he had was in
the desk that stood in the corner of the room, and putting his
hand in his pocket took out the key, which he threw on the
table; during the time he had been in the room the ruffian
was threatening him with immediate destruction; how-
ever, he took up the key, and then laid down the blunder-
buss and went towards the desk, when the Priest drew out
one of the pistols, fired at him and killed him on the spot.
The moment the report of the shot was heard, the hall-door
was forced in, and four men entered, and rushed into the
room. The Priest, collected for the worst event, took up
the blunderbuss, when he heard the crash of the door, and
firing amongst them as they entered, killed two, and a third
with the reserved pistol; the servant attacked the fourth with
the pitchfork, and inflicted a wound in his back, but he, un-
luckily escaped.—The circumstance reflects great credit on
the Priest—and the fidelity of his servant will be of good
effect, in deterring villainy from its usual deperate course,
in many parts of the country.—*Saunders's News-Letter.*
