DEATH OF MR PATRICK F HARTIGAN

We announce with extreme regret the death of
 Mr Patrick Hartigan, which took place on Thurs-
 day night in Liverpool under very sad circum-
 stances. The deceased gentleman was staying at
 the Adelphi Hotel, Liverpool, and, through some
 inexplicable cause, he fell from one of the windows
 of the hotel, death supervening in a short time.
 The announcement of his untimely death has been
 learned in sporting circles with poignant sorrow.
 He was a well-known, popular, and successful
 racehorse trainer, with his quarters at Ogbourne,
 Wiltshire, and belonged to one of the best-known
 and most widely respected County Limerick
 families. He was son of the late Dr T. Hartigan,
 Tarbrook, Croom, and married, some few years
 ago, Miss Edwards, daughter of the late Mr
 George Edwards, of theatrical fame. In private
 life Mr Hartigan was a genial, affable, and kindly
 young man, beloved by all who knew him, and his
 death in the prime of life will be mourned by all
 who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

An inquest was held at Liverpool yesterday.
 Mrs N. Hartigan said her husband was thirty-
 seven, and was of a most cheerful disposition. He
 had lost the sight of the right eye and could not
 see in the dark.

A verdict was returned that Mr Hartigan was
 killed as a result of falling through a window.
 There was no evidence to show how he fell.
