The first division of the 63th regiment arrived Castlebar on Tuesday

The Waterford Regiment, for some time quartered in Galway, have received a route to proceed to their county, preparatory to their being disembodied on the 8th of April, the first division will march to-morrow.

The Kerry Militia, quartered in Loughrea, Ballinasloe, &c. have received a route for Tralee, to be disembodied on the 2d of April.

On Saturday last, a detachment of the 35th regiment which arrived in Cork harbour, from Ostend, marched from thence, with the heavy baggage of that corps, to join the head quarters at Waterford

Monday a detachment of the 58th regt. which lately arrived at Cove, with the heavy baggage of that regt from Ostend, marched from thence for Birr, where that corps is at present stationed.

The Hon. Lady Julia Gore, the Rev. Edward Bowen, and Capt Bowen, arrived at Portpatrick, after a pleasant passage of three hours.
