Saturday, March 18.

The revenue bill read a third time, and a rider relative to revelting the lands of the

Genevan colony in the Crown.

A debate arose on a question for striking out a clause which was foreign to the bill. The Duke of Leinster, Lords Mountgarret, Mountmorres, Defert, and Lord Farnham, in particular, contended, that it was a most unprecedented innovation to tack a rider to the revenue bill, which should have been the object of a feparate law; that it would be vain to look for the regulation in question another day under the title of the bill; that this had been imaggled through the Commons in a very thin House. Lord Farnham with great ability difplayed the egregious abfurdity of tacking a perpetual law, which was to operate for ever, encouragement of the fiftheries on the fea-coasts to a revenue bill, which was to expire in a year; and it was asked of Lords in the confidence of Administration, and of their Minifter, if any fuch there were in that House, to account: for fo strange a mode of proceeding, and to justify it if they could.

The Archbiftion of Cashel and Lord Tyrone entered into a long discussion of the situation of the lands in question, and of the whole scheme of the Genevan emigration, which, however well intended, had proved altogether abortive; and that it was necessary to revest the land, in the Crown, and apply them to the public ac-

Lord Earlsfort disclaimed the idea of particular confidence on the part of Administration, for granting the bounty 18, against it 42. and faid all Lords, as Hereditary Counfellors of the late Crown, were entitled to their confidence; but he spoke on public grounds as a well wither to the prefent Administration: No man was more an enemy to jobs than he was; as to the prefent ofheme, the nation had early embraced it in the Administration of the Marquis of Buckingham, but fince that fettlement had not taken place, it was necessary to apply the town that had been built for the Genevan emigrants to Public uses. I am said his Lordthip, fure that no Admittration can gain by giving any lands to accomodate individuals with profitable jobs, and I must remind you, my Lords, of a reply that was made to a Miniiter in the days of Charles the Second, about | Monday, the cost of inclosing the Curragh, as a fettlement for one of his mittreffes, " that it would think the noble Lords on the other fide of the question are mittaken that this does not relate to the revenue bill: what is this but applying the lands in question to the purpose of revenue; what therefore is intended to create a fund of revenue, is furely the object of a revenue

Lord Mountgarret contended that it was a most dangerous precedent; that any matter might be thus introduced into a bill, however mischievous, and carried through a thin House without examination. As to the prefent regulation about vefting the lands of Knockroe in the Cown, with a view to let them to forme individual, if that were the scheme, he must difapprove it, for the lands in queltion were formerly appropriated to the support of Duncannot Fort, and that they ought to be reftored to that afe. I fear, my Lords, a job is intended from the complexion of this whole fession, and the general tenor of the conduct of the prefent jobbing Administra ion,
