Irish Parliamentary Debates.
HOUSE OF LORDS.

Saturday, March 18.
The revenue bill read a third time, and a rider relative to vesting the lands of the Genevan colony in the Crown.

A debate arose on a question for striking out a clause which was foreign to the bill. The Duke of Leinster, Lords Mountgarret, Mountmorres, Desart, and Lord Farnham, in particular, contended, that it was a most unprecedented innovation to tack a rider to the revenue bill, which should have been the object of a separate law; that it would be vain to look for the regulation in question another day under the title of the bill; that this had been smuggled through the Commons in a very thin House. Lord Farnham with great ability displayed the egregious absurdity of tacking a perpetual law, which was to operate for ever, to a revenue bill, which was to expire in a year; and it was asked of Lords in the confidence of Administration, and of their Ministers, if any such there were in that House, to account for so strange a mode of proceeding, and to justify it if they could.

The Archbishop of Cashel and Lord Tyrone entered into a long discussion of the situation of the lands in question, and of the whole scheme of the Genevan emigration, which, however well intended, had proved altogether abortive; and that it was necessary to revert the land, in the Crown, and apply them to the public account.

Lord Earlsfort disclaimed the idea of particular confidence on the part of Administration, and said all Lords, as Hereditary Counsellors of the late Crown, were entitled to their confidence; but he spoke on public grounds as a well wisher to the present Administration: No man was more an enemy to jobs than he was; as to the present scheme, the nation had early embraced it in the Administration of the Marquis of Buckingham, but since that settlement had not taken place, it was necessary to apply the town that had been built for the Genevan emigrants to public uses. I am said his Lordship, sure that no Administration can gain by giving any lands to accommodate individuals with profitable jobs, and I must remind you, my Lords, of a reply that was made to a Minister in the days of Charles the Second, about the cost of inclosing the Curragh, as a settlement for one of his mistresses, "that it would cost but a trifle, namely, Three Crowns." I think the noble Lords on the other side of the question are mistaken that this does not relate to the revenue bill: what is this but applying the lands in question to the purpose of revenue; what therefore is intended to create a fund of revenue, is surely the object of a revenue bill.

Lord Mountgarret contended that it was a most dangerous precedent; that any matter might be thus introduced into a bill, however mischievous, and carried through a thin House without examination. As to the present regulation about vesting the lands of Knockree in the Crown, with a view to let them to some individual, if that were the scheme, he most disapprove it, for the lands in question were formerly appropriated to the support of Duncannon Fort, and that they ought to be restored to that use. I fear, my Lords, a job is intended from the complexion of this whole session, and the general tenor of the conduct of the present jobbing Administration.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.
Saturday, March 18.

The House resolved itself into a committee on the Limerick Jail bill.

Sir Henry Hartington in the chair.
Went through the same without any amendment, and the report to be received on Monday.

Note.—By mistake it was mentioned in former debates, that a bill was read the first and second time for building a Jail and Market in the City of Limerick, which should have been for a Jail and *Marbalsea*.

Read also a third time, the bill for establishing the business of pawnbroking, and to enable persons under certain restrictions, to carry on the same.

Passed, and ordered that Mr. Holmes do carry said bill to the Lords, and desire their concurrence.

Went into a committee on the bill for the encouragement of the fisheries on the sea-coasts of this kingdom.

Sir Hugh Hill in the chair.

On the clause being read, for granting a bounty on the tonnage of vessels employed in the fishery, an objection was made to giving any bounty to vessels that came under the description of wherries by Mr. George Ponsonby, and Mr. Bushe, who stated that many frauds had been committed in procuring the bounty on fishing.

On the other hand, Colonel Cunningham and the Hon. Dennis Brown contended, that vessels of this description were the properest to carry on the fishing.

The committee divided, when there were for granting the bounty 18, against it 42.

The bill was then gone through, and ordered that the report be received on Monday.

The House resolved itself into a committee on the bill for the encouragement of the inland navigation.

Captain Burgh in the chair.

Col. Tarrant was called to the bar, who underwent a desultory examination, in respect to the expence of making a cut from the Canal at Monastereven to Athy, and from thence to the town of Carlow; he stated the expence for bringing the Canal from Monastereven to Athy to be about 25,000l.—And as he had not made out any more accurate estimates, the chairman reported progress, and got leave to sit again on Monday.

A message from the Lords, by two of the Masters in Chancery, that they had agreed without any amendments, to an engrossed bill, for continuing and amending several laws relating to his Majesty's revenue, and for the more effectually preventing frauds therein, and for other purposes.

Ordered that the Right Hon. John Bessford attend his Grace the Lord Lieutenant with the said bill, in order to be certified into Great Britain, and to be returned to this House.

Postponed to Monday the different order not proceeded on. To which day the House adjourned.

Monday, March 20.

Sir Henry Hartington reported the Limerick Gaol bill; agreed thereto, ordered to be engrossed.

The Sol. Gen. introduced the Police bill, which was strongly opposed by Sir Edw. Newenham, Mr. Hartley, Mr. Grattan, Sir Henry Hartington, and other respectable members, and supported by all the members in administration. The bill was read the first time, and

Last Saturday three men bringing a rail of turf to the revenue cutter, near Tarbert, the boat overset, and they were drowned; one of them was supported for some time by two oars, and spoke to the persons who took him up, but was so much benumbed with the cold, he died before they could get him to a house.

Last Tuesday in the County Court, one Meany, was convicted upon the clearest evidence of an assault and rape, on a woman the mother of ten children, in one of the large fields of Kilpeacon, adjoining the high road.

Same day in the City-Court, Hugh M'Daniel, alias Wag, was capitally convicted of stealing a Watch, out of the house of John Fitzgerald, on the Quay.

Last Tuesday night a servant of Dr O'Callaghan's in the Square, was killed by excessive drinking of whiskey.

Yesterday three troops of the 18th Light Dragoons, arrived here, and this day three more, which are to be cantoned in Rathkeal, Newcastle, Shanagolden, &c.

Died. Last Tuesday Mrs Vincent, wife of Mr Thomas Vincent burgess; she bore a lingering illness with christian resignation; her death is greatly regretted by her friends and acquaintance on account of her many good qualities.
