### FORD CARS.

#### Reported Intended 50 per Cent. Tax Cut.

The Dublin "Evening Mail" learns from a  
 well-informed source that the road tax on Ford  
 cars is about to be reduced by 50 per cent. This  
 will reduce the tax on touring cars from £18 to  
 £9 yearly, and on lorries from £16 to £8.

It is expected that the reduction will be retro-  
 spective as and from January 1st, 1925. In cases  
 where the tax has been already paid on the  
 higher scale, instead of refunding the difference  
 the authorities will extend the licence.

The reduction of the tax is due to a desire to  
 encourage the Ford industry in the Free State.  
 It is estimated that upwards of 20,000 Ford cars  
 are in use in the 26 counties.
