What the termination of the war will be, we eagerly look forward to the arrival of the King, and the unhappy country, which, has long been suffering.

THE ARMY.

... On Sunday, the 5th instant, the battle of Barossa, a most interesting battle, was fought on the new ground in this island. The Governor, Lieutenant General Sir David Baird, was present that day for presenting new colours to the Welsh's own Irish regiment, of the 73d Regt. The standards were beautifully ornamented, with the French Eagle, the Prince's Plume in silver. The colours were presented in front of the temporary enclosure, and made a most soldierly appearance.

... The battalion formed three sides of a square, and was led up by a brilliant assemblage of the island. In the centre of this square stood the general, having the new colours guarded by the colour sergeants. He had selected that day for their new colours, adorned with the arms of the King, and beloved by the people, pleased to bestow, together with the gold and silver, had a reward for the gallant conduct they had shown on the 15th, but particularly in the brilliant battle of Barossa, where he had been called upon to command the troops in person.

Warlike preparations go busily forward. A large quantity of cannon has been ordered to be shipped for Ostend. Fresh transports have been taken up, and troops are marching from several quarters to the coast, there to be embarked for the Continent.

Wednesday last, orders were sent off, to the Lords-Lieutenant of the different counties, the militia of which have been disembodied, to re-embodied them as speedily as possible.

A detachment of three officers and one hundred men belonging to the 82d regiment, under the command of Captain Begbie, disembarked at Quebec on the 27th November last. This detachment from their soldierlike appearance and the high order they were in, excited the high admiration of every one. The 1st battalion of the 82d, under the command of Major Proctor, is now stationed in Upper Canada, on the Niagara Frontier. Their late gallant commander, Gen. Grant, is returned home on promotion, and has also Major Vincent.

A ministerial paper of Wednesday, has the following paragraph:—“All the crown jewels (of France) are safe; they are now in London, particularly the diamond which Bonaparte wore in the hilt of his sword, which is said to be the most valuable now in Europe. The Duchess of Wellington brought over these precious articles.”

A debate took place in the House of Commons on Monday night, on the motion of Mr. Whitbread, for such information respecting the proceedings of the Congress of Vienna, as may be afforded without inconvenience. The motion called up Lord Castlereagh, who, in a speech, very able in statement, and very enlightened in the review it took of the state of Europe, as connected with those proceedings, attracted the attention, and received the applause of the house.

The Treasury Reports states, that a Loan of not less than thirty six millions will be required immediately after the receipts.

Monday se'night the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland was introduced to the Prince Regent, at Carlton House, on his arrival in London, and had a long audience. The Duchess of Dorset is also arrived.

APPREHENSION OF LORD COCHRANE.

Tuesday last, about 2 o'clock, Lord Cochrane appeared in the lobby of the House of Commons, whence he went into the house, took his seat on the Treasury Bench, and began to read some papers. Shortly after Mr. Jones, of the King's Bench, arrived, with Lavender and Pace the officers. They told his Lordship that he was their prisoner, and on his refusal to go with them, till he should have made the complaint that he came there to preter, they seized him by force, and conveyed him to the strong room of the Sergeant at Arms. On searching him, some balls were found, and a bag of snuff, which he said it had been his intention to fling in the eyes of any body attempting to seize him.
