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...Dublin freeholders petition against the police bill be received—motion put and agreed to.
When the clerk, proceeding to read the petition, came to that part where the petitioners mention the right of Parliament and charter of Dublin.

The Rt. Hon. Attorney Gen. said he would not suffer any petition to be read in that House that was a libel upon it. The petitioners, added he, take upon them to assert the dignity of Parliament, and the rights of the corporation of the city of Dublin, which the Corporation itself this day assembled, does not look upon as invaded. I therefore move, that this petition be rejected.

Sir Edward Newenham, said, that the meeting at Kilmainham was composed of men of the first rank and consequence in the county; men of integrity, honour and virtue; that they were interested in the good order and police of the county; that it was not their intention or meaning to insult parliament; their only wish was, to lay their grievances before the house; Sir Edward mentioned that he had another county petition to present, but found by the reception of the first that it would be in vain.

The House then resolved again in a committee on the police bill, and having gone thro' the remaining clauses, it was ordered to be reported to-morrow; on which occasion the Attorney General said, that there were two clauses in the Police-Bill that had occasioned much unnecessary alarm, for which reason, and to obviate these groundless fears, he would on the report move the expunging of that part of a clause that relates to the breaking into houses in search of vagabonds, &c. &c. and that which relates to the action of trespass, so as to leave the law in both cases exactly as it stood before.

Last Tuesday night a fire broke out in the house of William McCormick, outside John's-gate, which consumed the sam, with two adjoining Houses, one of which was tenanted by Christopher Healy, Linen-weaver, a very honest, industrious man, who is reduced to the greatest distress, his looms, yarn, &c. being totally destroyed.—A servant maid of McCormick's sticking a Candle over her bed, which falling into it, caused the above disaster.

The Rev. Dr. Maunsell's humane exertions in encouraging the people to draw water to the Fire Engine on the above occasion, merits the warmest thanks of the public; in all probability had he not been so active, the whole range of buildings would have been consumed.
