FOYNES HOUSING

At the weekly meeting of the Foynes Development Association, the housing question was again discussed, and the members of the deputation reported on their recent visit to the County Manager. It is tentatively proposed that thirty four-roomed houses, at an approximate weekly rent of 10/-, should be erected. Towards the end of last week, the County Manager, Mr. P. J. Meghen, and the County Engineer, Mr. P. Sheahan, accompanied by Mr. Patrick Fitzsimons, M.C.C., visited Foynes in connection with the selection of suitable sites. They were met on their arrival by Rev. M. J. Quinlan, C.C., Chairman, and Mr. E. J. Morrissey, Secretary, Foynes Development Association.

The bidding for these premises opened at £500, and after quick and spirited competition reached £1,030, at which figure they were knocked down to Mr. D. B. Fitzgerald, solr., in trust. Mr. A. Blood-Smyth, solr., had carriage of sale. "Mountain View," Thomondgate, detached residence (with possession), held under lease for 999 years, subject to a rent of £7; P.L.V., £16 (remission of rates for two years to run), were also offered for sale.
