

... was to drive to the generally in a coach, at Connell, where they met members of the Castleconnell Club. Following is from an old record—"The Castleconnell Club was composed of the first persons of fashion, and landed property of the country. They were of the class of bon-vivants, and drank high and drank deep. They wore a uniform of scarlet with gilt buttons, green silk waistcoat and breeches, a green ribbon on the waist with three Cs. in gold, in honor of "Castle Connell" Club." They never quarreled among themselves, which in those days of duels and swords must otherwise have proved fatal. All was harmony and good humour."

SAD SIGHTS.

There were also sad sights at the quay, cruel exhibitions of dog bears, performing dogs, monkeys and jugglers, and, of all, during the cholera epidemic, 1832 and 1833, the terrible cry of the dead cart on its wheels—"Any dead here; lead here." Patrick Arthur, who built the quay himself, lived in No. 1, the corner of Francis Street. But the changes were taking place—the conversion of the city to new and commodious residences at Newtownperry, the building of the railway bridge, the stationing of a general in the New Barracks (Sarsfield), who arranged for me to play three afternoons a week in the Crescent, the opening of the railway station, the building of the new quays and docks, the diverted shipping to lower the river, and, finally, in the same fashion decreed the moving of Newtownperry and like a flock of thoughtless sheep her minions unquestionably obeyed. "Ichabod, thy glory hath departed," was inscribed on the deserted quay, which rapidly declined to a collection of tenement houses and small shops. Now, there are no more working citizens who propose to keep away this monument of the most progressive and enterprising period of mediaeval Limerick.

RESERVED FUNCTION

In reply to a proposal from the Urban Council that the boundary should be extended, the Clare County Manager (D. O'Keeffe) said this was a reserved function for the Council, and a special meeting were called to attend and explain the matter.
