

INSOLVENT DEBTORS' COURT.

Yesterday, Mr. Commissioner Burrowes held a Court for the discharge of Insolvent Debtors. Twenty-six persons claimed the benefit of the Act in the City, and fifteen from the County. The entire of the former were discharged; but of the latter, one, Michael Behane, was remanded for six months, and Patrick M'Eniry was dismissed on his petition; the former was opposed on the part of Joseph P. Molony, who employed him to execute a decree, the amount of which he levied, and immediately converted to his own use—and by Messrs. Roy & Co., Brewers, to whom he applied in October last, with a recommendation from a Gentleman in this County and exhibiting a proposal for a house, which he stated he had taken at Adare, and intended immediately entering into public business. On the faith of this representation two tierces of porter were sent him to Adare, where it was ascertained he had no house; but having contrived to get them into his possession, he sold them to a spirit retailer there, and received the purchase money. In a fortnight after, in a similar manner, he succeeded in imposing on Miss E. Tucker, who likewise advanced him two tierces of porter, which he took care to dispose of to the best advantage, by which time it appeared he had no establishment whatever. Under these fraudulent circumstances, the Court thought it but proper to remand him for the period of six months; the debts in his schedule amounted to 75l. 16s. 3d.—The debts of the last Insolvent discharged amounted to the sum of 993l. 3s. 3d.—The aggregate of debts paid this day under the Act exceeded 8,000l.

On the 10th, 11th, and 12th instant, Mr. Burrowes presided in the Insolvent Debtor's Court for the County and City of Cork, when one hundred and twenty-one Insolvent cases were disposed of. Eight or ten persons were remanded for ten and twelve months, and five petitions were dismissed.

On the 15th, the Court sat in Tralee, where fifty-five cases were heard, a number of the claimants were remanded, and some dismissed on their petitions.

On Monday next, Mr. Commissioner Burrowes will hold a Court at Ennis, where there are only eleven Insolvent cases to be investigated. The duties which devolve upon this eminent Lawyer are most arduous.

To the Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.

SIR,—Since my return from the Country, I have perused the Letter of Captain THOMSON, the Governor of the County Jail, which, if it should be thought to contradict, does not alter my opinion as to the exclusion of the Scriptures from the Prison, from whatever influence it may have arisen; but that such has been the practice, may be proved by reference to the Minute-book of the Ladies Committee, from which it appears that the only Protestant Testament within the reach of the Women having been removed by a Romish Clergyman, a request was entered, on the part of the Ladies Committee, for 6 Douay Testaments to be supplied, and stating, at the same time, that merely the reading of them should be attended to, unaccompanied by any comment of theirs; the answer to which request by the Chairman was as follows:—

“The Board do not think it necessary to order any Testaments.”

I was, therefore, warranted to infer that the Scriptures were excluded; and not being in possession of the Regulation about Prisoners under sentence of death, as stated in Captain THOMSON's Letter, I was led to conclude that the plain truths of that Holy Volume having been declared to a poor Convict under sentence for execution, was the principal cause of offence.

Having mentioned these facts, I beg to add that they have been extracted from me in consequence of the statements made to the public; nor would I have appeared in your columns but from the attack made in the *Limerick Evening Post* on those Ladies, whose greatest censure on the occasion referred to, I must consider their highest praise. Freely do I forgive the writer of those observations, and hope in his last moments he will be induced to treat with less levity the serious truths of God's word than at present he seems disposed to do; and with great deference to those Gentlemen who manage the Jail, I would take the liberty of saying that I do conceive every poor prisoner (of whatsoever denomination) should have the Scriptures placed within his reach, whether he enquire for them or not, or whether recommended by his Instructors or not; the unhappy creatures who enter the walls of a prison, it is not to be expected bring with them
