

al defeat of Shere Singh's rebel armies, by our brave countryman, Lord Gough, whose camp is only four miles distant from the enemy, and which the Moulton force, under General Whish, was expected to reach on the 20th of February. The glorious and decisive result of this conflict we can entertain no doubt of. Lord Fitz-Clarence applied for a command in India, but no vacancy.

The second Major of the 24th, (Howell Paynter,) who was severely wounded in the late battle at Jhelum, appointed senior Lieut.-Col. of the Regt. and senior Major M. Smith, of the 29th, second Lieut.-Col. of the 24th—Brevet Major John Harris, and Capt. Blachford to be Majors—Lieut. Berry, is now senior of his rank in the 24th. The six senior Ensigns of the 10th, 18th, 22d, 29th, 53d, and 98th, are promoted to Lieutenancies in the 24th.

Lieut.-Colonel Paynter, 24th, is son-in-law of Capt. Bradshaw, Tipperary. Captain Browne, 24th, wounded at the Jhelum, promoted to a Majority in the 29th Regiment without purchase.

In our columns will be found a report of the dinner given, on Saturday, to Sir Charles Napier, by the East India Company. We regret to observe the course which it was thought proper to pursue on that occasion with reference to Lord Gough. His name did not appear on the list of toasts, although his services in India would surely have merited for him that distinction. Lord Gough has been for more than half a century engaged in active duties. His name is honourably connected in every field in which he has appeared; and the man whose achievements in China, on the Sutlej, and elsewhere, have been so prominent in the military annals of the age, and whose honour as a brave soldier has never once been tarnished, deserved better treatment at the hands of those who assembled to compliment the new Indian Commander-in-Chief. Lord Hardinge, indeed, paid a passing compliment to the gallant Gough, but with that exception no notice was taken of his name. The recollection of Sobraon alone would have deserved the honourable recognition that was omitted or denied.—*The Press.*

Lieut.-General Sir George Napier has been offered the situation of Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands, in succession to Lieut.-General Lord Seaton.
