

## DUNGANNON.

### REPORT upon the PROPOSED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY of the BOROUGH of DUNGANNON.

THE Liberties of the Town are stated to comprise two whole Townlands, viz. Drumcoo and Ranaghan; a portion of a third, Gortmerron, and three small pieces in three other Townlands, comprehending altogether about 836 statute acres. ANCIENT LIMITS.

Dungannon is a small Market and Borough Town in the Barony of Dungannon and County of Tyrone, situate about four miles from the most Southerly Point of Lough Neagh. It has been progressively improving for the last two years, there not being now more than ten uninhabited Houses, whereas in November 1831 there were 83; and in September 1833, 100. The trade in Linen and Grain has very much improved. The Town lies entirely in the Parish of Drumglass, and the whole of it belongs in fee to the Earl of Ranfurly. DESCRIPTION OF THE TOWN.

The Population amounted in 1831 to 3,758; some increase has taken place since that period. Population.

The Borough Cess is for the purpose of paving, lighting, cleansing and watching the Town, and is levied under the provisions of 9 Geo. IV. c. 82. Local Rates.

Houses of the value of 5*l.* to 10*l.* pay 6*d.* in the pound; from 10*l.* to 20*l.*, 9*d.* in the pound; and above 20*l.*, 1*s.* in the pound; under the value of 5*l.* they pay nothing. For the last year (ending July 1835) the assessment amounted to 288*l.* odd.

The County Cess is variable, and is levied for the purpose of keeping the Roads in repair, paying the Constabulary and other public establishments. It is assessed twice a year by the Grand Jury of the County, and amounted for the last year to 264*l.* 11*s.* County Rates.

The following is the Boundary proposed, which coincides with that of the Parliamentary Borough:—

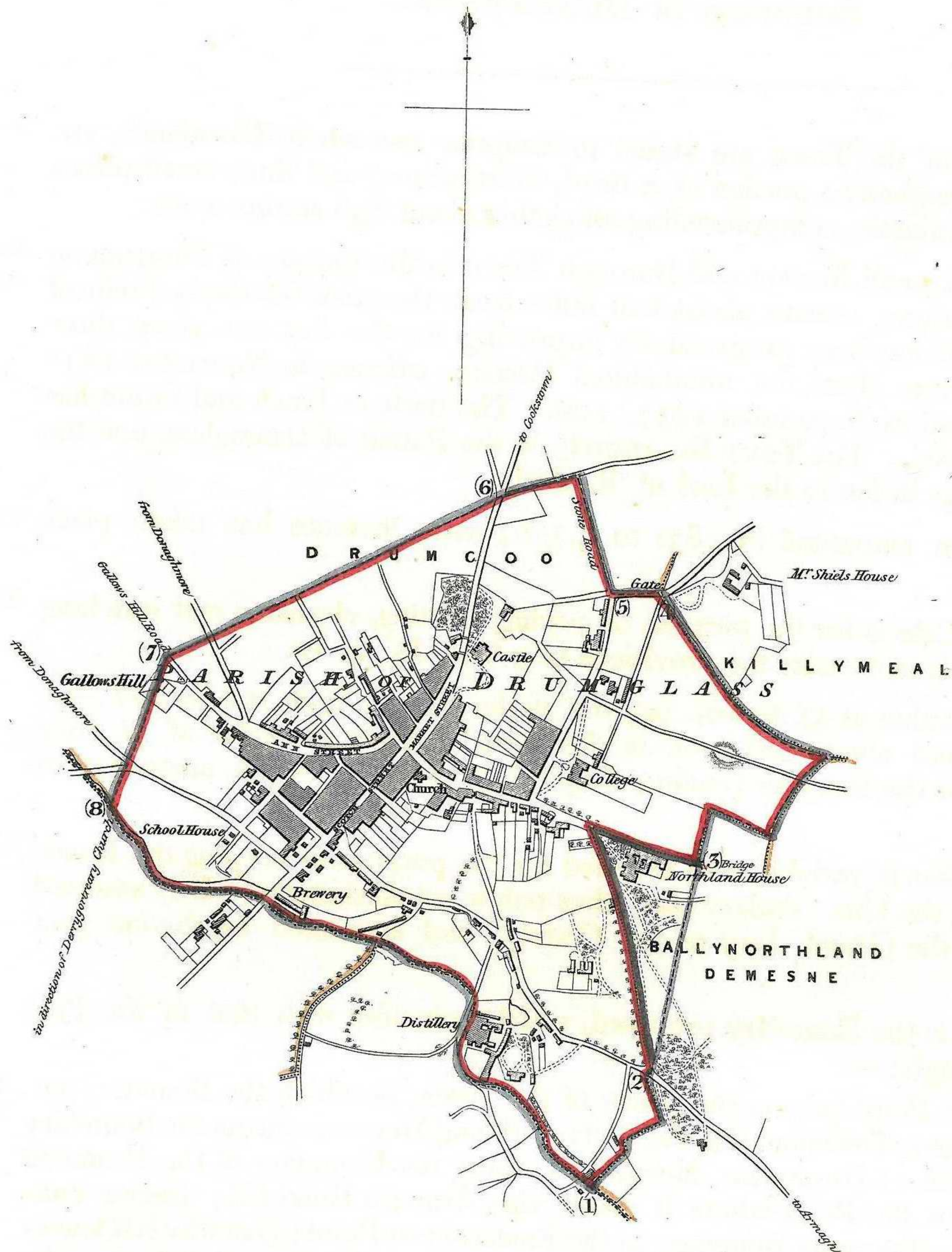
From the Point (1), on the South of the Town, at which the Boundary between Drumcoo Townland and the Ballynorthland Demesne meets the Boundary of the Parish of Drumglass, Northward, along the Boundary of the Drumcoo Townland to the Point where it meets the Armagh Road (2); thence continuing along the same Boundary to the Easternmost Point (3) at which it leaves the Road at the back of Northland House; thence, Northward, following the same Boundary of the Drumcoo Townland, to the Point (4) at which it meets, close by the Gate leading to Mr. Shiel's House in Killymeal, an old Road which leads Westward into the Store Road; thence along such old Road to the Point at which the same joins the Store Road (5); thence, Northward, along the Store Road to the Point at which the same meets the Cookstown Road (6); thence in a straight Line to a Point on the Gallows Hill Road (7), which is distant Two hundred and Twenty Yards (measured along the Gallows Hill Road) to the West of the Point at which the same leaves the Donaghmore Road; thence in a straight Line, in the direction of the Tower of Derrygortreavy Church, to the Point (8) at which such straight Line cuts the Boundary of the Parish of Drumglass; thence, Southward, along the Boundary of the Parish of Drumglass to the Point first described. 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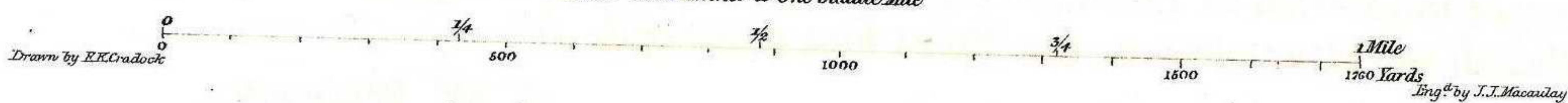
