

ENNISCORTHY.

REPORT upon the PROPOSED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY of the BOROUGH of ENNISCORTHY.

THE ancient Limits of the Borough of Enniscorthy extend from the Town about a mile to the North, three miles to the North-east, one mile and a half to the South, about two miles to the East, and three quarters of a mile to the West. ANCIENT LIMITS
OF THE BOROUGH.

The Town of Enniscorthy is in the County of Wexford, and situated on the West Bank of the River Slaney, which is navigable for Sloops. An extensive trade in Corn is carried on between Enniscorthy and the Town of Wexford. On the East Bank of the Slaney are the suburbs of Drumgold and Temple Shannon, which are joined to Enniscorthy by a Stone Bridge. The place has the appearance of prosperity. DESCRIPTION OF
THE TOWN.

The Population in 1831 amounted to 5,955, and no increase has taken place since that period. Population.

The following is the Boundary I propose, embracing the Town of Enniscorthy, with the Suburbs of Drumgold and Temple Shannon :—

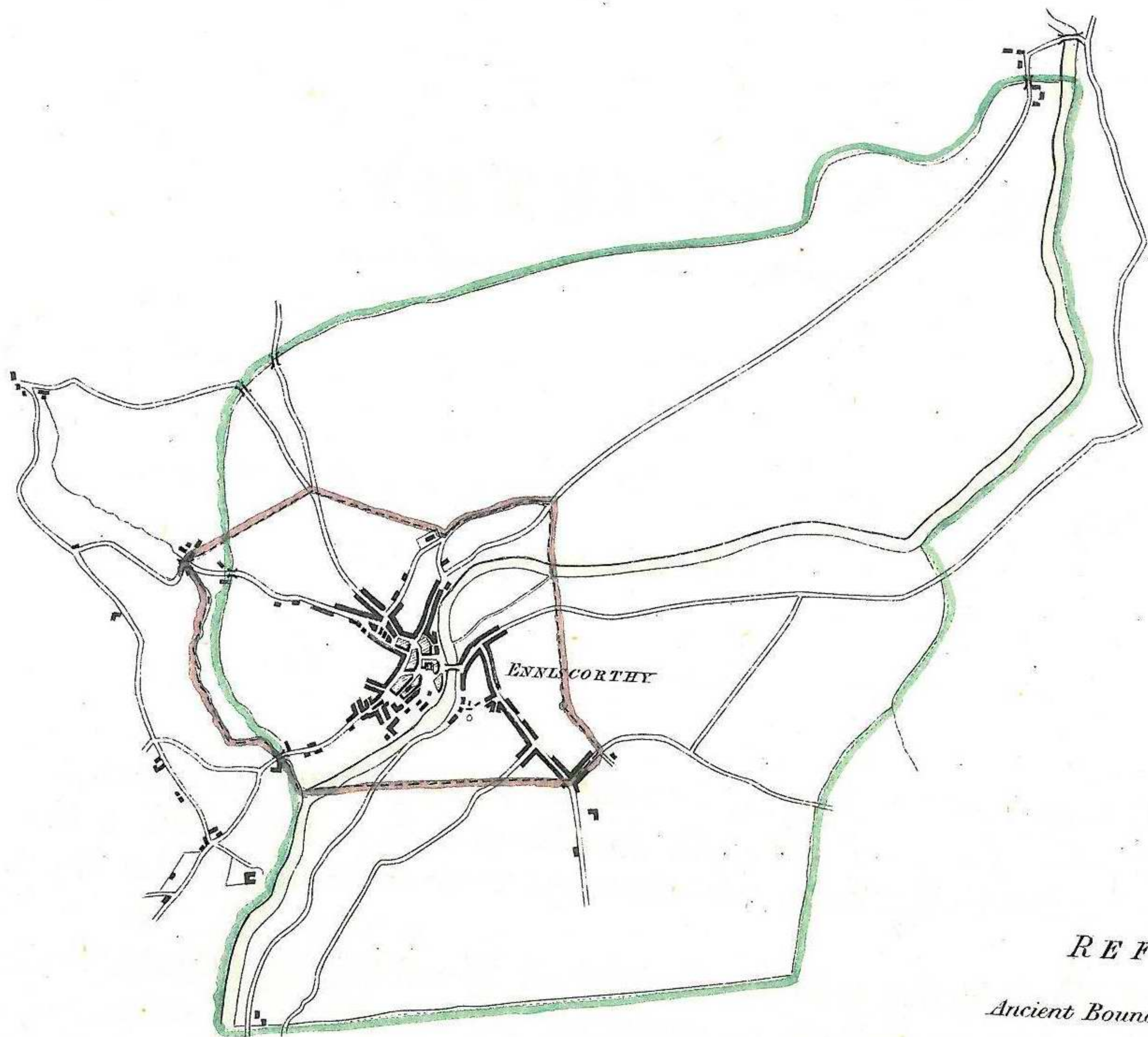
From the Point (1) on the North of the Town where the Killan and Killeely Roads meet, in a straight Line past the North side of the Bishop's Residence to (2) where the Line cuts the Road to Gorey ; thence in an Easterly direction along the Road to (3) a Bridge where the two Roads join ; thence in a South direction along a Gully or Stream to (4) where it falls into the River Slaney ; thence in a straight Line to (5) a Windmill in ruins on the summit of Vinegar Hill ; thence to (6) where a Lane from the South-east meets the Clandow Road ; thence along the Road in a South-west direction to (7) where it meets the old Wexford Road ; thence in a straight Line to (8) where the Urrin Stream falls into the River Slaney, continuing along the Urrin Stream to (9) Carley's Bridge on the New Ross Road ; thence in a straight Line to the Point first described.
