

## ENNISKILLEN.

### REPORT upon the PROPOSED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY of the BOROUGH of ENNISKILLEN.

THE ancient Borough is stated to comprise the "entire of the Island of Ennis-killen," "the Castle or Fortalice of Enniskillen alone excepted." ANCIENT LIMITS.

The Town of Enniskillen is situated in a central position in the County of Fermanagh, on an Island in a narrow branch of Lough Erne, connecting its upper and lower portions. It has two Suburbs, each connected with the Island of Enniskillen by a stone Bridge. The Island and the Eastern Suburb are in the Parish of Enniskillen; the Western Suburb is in the Parish of Rossory. DESCRIPTION OF THE TOWN.

There is not any Local Rate. The Town is neither paved, lighted nor watched. The principal Road through the Town is repaired by the County. Local Rates.

The County Cess is levied on an old valuation of the land, and varies considerably; a new valuation is now in progress. County Rate.

The Population of the entire Town in 1831 amounted to 6,056. Population.

In case any alteration in the Boundary should be contemplated, I propose the following, which comprises the same extent as that adopted for the Parliamentary Borough in 1832, with the addition of a portion of the adjacent waters, and the small Island called Piper's Island:—

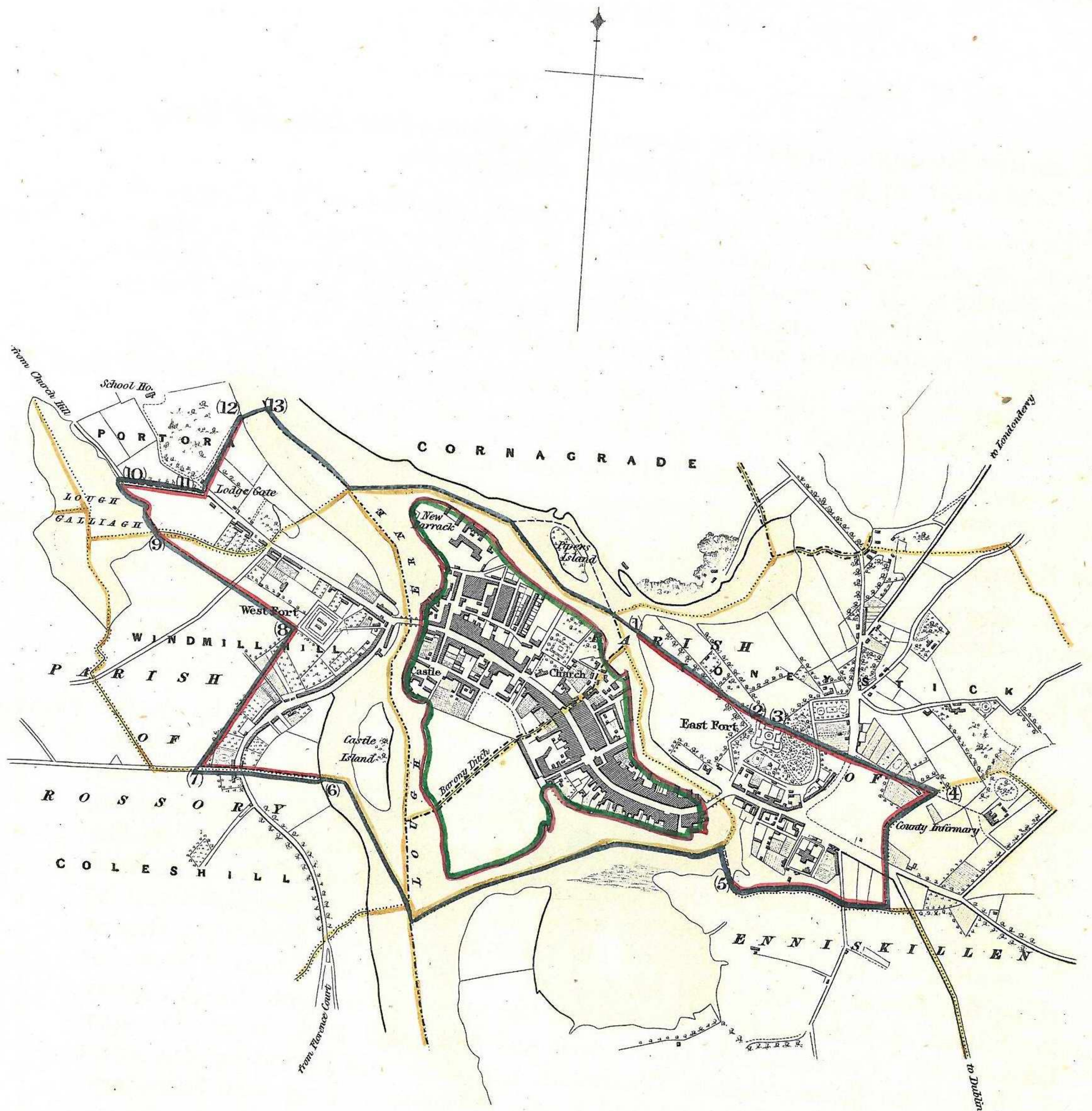
From the Westernmost Point (1) of the Townland of Toneystick, on the East of the Town, in a straight Line to the Salient Point (2) of the North-western Bastion of East Fort; thence in a straight Line to the Salient Point (3) of the North-eastern Bastion of East Fort; thence in a straight Line in the direction of the South-western Angle of the County Infirmary, to the Point (4) at which such straight Line cuts the Boundary of the Townland of Toneystick; thence, Southward, along the Boundary of the Townland of Toneystick to the Point at which the same meets Lough Erne (5); thence along the Townland Boundary through the middle of the Channel South of the Island of Enniskillen, to the Point (6) at which it joins the Boundary between the Townlands of Cole's Hill and Windmill Hill, in the Western Suburb of the Town; thence, Westward, along the said Boundary to a Point (7) which is distant One hundred Yards (measured along such Boundary) beyond the Point at which the same joins the Florence Court Road; thence, in a straight Line to the South-western Angle (8) of West Fort; thence in a straight Line to the Point at which the Boundary between the Townlands of Windmill Hill and Portora meets the Eastern Bank of Lough Galliagh (9); thence, Northward, along the Eastern Bank of Lough Galliagh to the Point at which the same meets the Church Hill Road (10); thence, towards Enniskillen, along the last-mentioned Road to the Lodge Gate of Portora School (11); thence along a Hedge which runs at the foot of the Lawn of Portora School, Northward, to Lough Erne, to the Point (12) at which the same meets Lough Erne; thence in the same direction to the middle of the Channel between the Townlands of Portora and Cornagrade (13); thence along the middle of the Channel and Southward of Piper's Island to the Point (1) first described.
