the said amendment made by the other House.
The A Gen. corroborated what the Speak-
er had said, and after a few observations, de-
clared he did his duty in moving, That the
consideration of this amendment be postponed
to the first of July.

The Right Hon. Secretary of State moved
for leave to bring in a bill to regulate present-
ments made by Grand Juries, for compen-
sation between clerks of the Crown and Peace
for the fees of prisoners—Leave being granted,
he presented the bill, which was also read a
first time and ordered to be read a second to-
morrow.

The order of the day being read for re-
ferring into Committee on the bill for encou-
raging and rendering effectual the Inland Na-
vigation.

Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Orde said, that
one of the purposes of this bill was for granting
4000l. to the Grand Canal Company, whose
claim he thought had not been stated in a man-
ner sufficiently clear, to authorize as yet the
granting of this sum, and there were other
perplexities in the bill that he thought made its
passing this session inexpedient.

Mr. Griffith defended the Grand Canal
Company whose claim had been considered in
a full Committee of the whole House, and a
report agreed to accordingly: He conjured
the Houle to reflect that if its faith was thus
broke, no set of men hereafter would be indu-
ced to prosecute any work with the hope of

The Chancellor of the Exchequer followed

motions were agreed to.

Cork, March 30. Last Saturday night from

several houses, from whence they took fire-
arms and horses, and obliged many to swear
that they would administer oaths the next day to
the different parishioners not to pay more tythes
than 4s. for potatoes, wheat and barley, 1s. 6d
oats and meadow 1s. per acre, and their usual
stipend to the Romish Clergy, for marriages,
&c. And on Sunday morning two notices to
some purpose were posted on the Chapel Gate
of Ballymartle, and directions therein that the
names of such as would not swear should be
posted in Blarney for Captain Lightfoot's in-
spection, which were pulled down by a young
Gentleman.

" The San Pedro de Alcantara, a Spanish
man of war and register ship from Lima, was
on the night of the 2d Feb. totally wrecked
