THE ARMY.

This day, the first division of the 2d bat. 16th regt. marched in here from Fermoy—they are to do garrison duty here Monday last, the arms of the Clare Militia were deposited in the Ordnance Depot in this city.
 The 3d Veteran Battalion have moved to Dumbarton Castle.
 The severeral regiments of the line on the Home Service, are immediately to be reduced from seventy to fifty rank and file, one Lieutenant, one Ensign, and three Serjeants per company, except the flank companies which are to have two Lieutenants.
 The late 2d bat. 72d embarked at Portsmouth on Wednesday se'night for India.
 The 2d bat 59th are now at Cowes.
 The 5th West Ind a regt, have left Port Royal for Nassau, which garrison is to be commanded by Col. Pye.
 The 1st battalion 95th regt. left Calcutta on the 6th Oct. for Madras.
 A large detachment of the 12th regt, have left Galway to do duty in Tuam.
 The 44th regt. have replaced the County Limerick militia, at Strabane.
 Orders were issued from the London War-Office to discontinue the expense of the Local Militia, by the reduction of the staff and calling in the arms, &c. &c. to the ordnance depots.
 The Roscommon Militia were disembodied at Boyle, on Monday last.
 Tuesday, the Kerry Militia were disembodied at Tralee, by Major Gen. Buller.
 Monday last, the North Cork militia were disembodied at Cork; and the Kilkenny militia at Kilkenny.

The relatives and friends of General Roche in this city and county, must be highly gratified to perceive the distinguished honors paid him by Ferdinand VII, for his highly meritorious conduct in the Peninsular war; General Roche has received from his Prince his license and authority to accept and wear the same, as stated in the London Gazette.—See first column.

On Monday night last, a number of ruffians surrounded and entered the house of Captain Stubber, of Ballinakil, near Rathdowny, Queen's County—on entering, they placed sentinels on the doors and on the Captain and his Lady, they then regaled themselves and continued carousing for several hours—after which, having yoked one of Mr. S's horses to a cart, they plundered the house, and carried off every article of value the horse and cart could carry. Information of the above having reached that active and useful Magistrate, George Steele, of Kyle, Esq. he apprehended five of the villains, about twelve o'clock on Wednesday morning, in Burreis in Ossory, and committed them to Maryboro' Jail. On their persons several of the stolen articles were found.

On the night of Saturday last, some villains contrived to get into the shop of Mr. John Vaughan, Miltown, Co. Clare an industrious man, and stole thereout shop goods, cash and bank notes to the amount of £400 and upwards.

Wednesday morning as Mr. Studdert, of Dromellihy, Co. Clare, was on his way to Ennis, he was stopt on the Boughnema road, by a single foot pad, who presented a pistol at him, and demanded his money; having searched his pockets, and but finding a small quantity of silver about him, returned it, and suffered him to proceed. In the course of an hour after, a Mr. Honan, who lives in the west of that county, happened to come the same way, was also stopped, it was supposed by the same foot pad, who likewise demanded money; having searched him, and finding no money in his possession, he desired him proceed; he had gone only a few perches, when the fellow called out to him to stop, but H. set spurs to his horse, and, notwithstanding a shot being fired after him, he escaped unhurt. Mr. Honan had the papers of consequence in a side pocket, which fortunately escaped the robber's search.

The Royal Marriage is not to take place as soon as expected, Thursday night, Hugh Jackson, Esq. of Cremorne, county Maghan, fell into the Liffey, and was drowned—he has left a wife and three children.
 The Shannon, from New York, for Drogheda, with flax, tar, &c. was on Monday wrecked off Ennishowen.

Saturday last, the Hon. W. W. Quin, M. P. in the chair, when several estimates for the erection of a new County Gaol, (according to the plan already approved of,) was laid before them, and after due deliberation the proposal of Messrs Pain and Hannans was accepted and approved of, which amounts to £21,250, with the securities of the Right Hon Colonel Vereker, M. P. and Messrs. Mark, Fisher, & Mark. The Commissioners also resolved, that application should be made to government, for a proper officer to be sent down, to assist them in the selection of a site for the gaol.

The sum voted by the Grand Jury will be advanced by Government in the first instance—and repaid by instalments of one 12th part at each assize, to be raised on the county so that it will take six years to raise the whole sum—when the necessity of a new gaol is taken into consideration this sum will appear trivial, and will not be felt, as it does not amount to 1 1/2d. per acre on the county at each assize.—The first instalment is already provided for by several sums on hands, which have been re-presented for the purpose—so that there will be but one instalment to be raised this year, and that will be after next summer assizes
