Duff, preceded by the whole of his Staff, rode

Regiment of Light Dragoons were drawn up in
a hollow square to receive him; here Sir James

the Box in which they were deposited at the Bank
of Messrs. Maunell, he presented them to the
four eldest Ensigns of the two Battalions, at the
head of their respective Grenadier Companies,

the Bands in the Garrison.—Silence having been
proclaimed, Sir James addressed the Officers and
Men in an appropriate and animated Speech, every
period of which breathed the steady Loyalty and
most ardent Zeal of a good and gallant Soldier—
after this the Procession, with their new Banners
flying, returned along the Line, the Men pre-
serving Arms, and the Officers saluting as they passed.
The Grenadiers having regained their position, at
the head of their respective Battalions, the whole
Line marched to the Grand Parade of the New
Barracks, where they were formed into a hollow
square, in the midst of which the new Standards
were erected before a temporary Altar of Drums,
—here the Chaplain of the Garrison, (the Rev.
Mt. Ingram,) proceeded to Consecrate the Ban-
ners, in a Form of Prayer composed for the oc-
casion, which was followed by a most eloquent,
energetic, and impressive Sermon, on the several
Duties a Soldier owes to his God, his Country,
and his King,—after this the old Colours were
burned, and their Ashes having been enclosed in
a strong Box, were buried with great solemnity
in the centre of the Square, amidst the discharge
of Musquetry, and the sounds of Martial Music.

The evening concluded with a Grand Ball and
Supper, given by the Officers of the two Batta-
lions of the 46th, at the Assembly Rooms—where
upwards of 500 of the principal Inhabitants of
the City and its Vicinity, spent the night in the
utmost harmony and festivity.
